

In the past few weeks I have been watching and listening and I hear so many of our people preparing and getting ready for the Christmas Holiday. Did you get your tree yet? Did you decorate your house? Are you done shopping for your presents? I have so much baking to do, I don't know how I am going to get it all done. I sense a real energy and fervor amongst our people as they prepare for Christmas.



gifts nonetheless. Of course, the greatest gift we receive this holiday season is the gift of the birth of Christ. This gift although it is not something we can see and hold it means more to us than all the gifts and presents this world can offer. The gift of the birth of Christ is really the gift of salvation; the gift of the Kingdom of heaven; and the gift of eternal life.

It is my sincere hope that we are not only preparing for the day of Christmas by engaging in the more commercial side of the preparations, presents; food; decorations; etc. I haven't forgotten that many of you are fasting in order to receive communion and I know that it is not easy fasting at this time of year when there are so many Christmas parties with all kinds of food. I am sure that there were many of you who gave up many a tasty morsel at the office Christmas Party. Of course, I remind you that it is not only food we give up when we fast but also sin as well.

The presents we give one another this Christmas are heart felt expressions of love and joy. None of us can forget the looks of joy in our children's faces as they open presents on Christmas day. Sometimes I think they like opening the presents more than playing with the toys they receive. Each one of us probably has a memory of a favorite toy that we received as children. Each of us has gifts we have been given some have been given more some less, but all have This gift is not something that we wait to receive at some future date this is a gift that each of us has right now. The gift of eternal life started at the time of our birth and continues from now until forever. We don't need face lifts, we don't need the fountain of youth, we don't need the human growth hormone that we hear advertised on the radio because we already have eternal life. And we thank the Lord for the gift of life that he has given us both through his birth, his death and resurrection.

But I have to say that the most important gift we give this year is not the one we buy for our children, or our parents, or our spouses or anyone else. The most important gift you can give is the gift you give to Jesus. You might be thinking Father John are you crazy? What can I buy for God? Well of course I know that you can't buy anything for God that He can't create for himself anyway, but you can still give him a gift. You can give him the gift of yourself. In the Divine Liturgy we say, "let us commit ourselves and one another and our whole life to Christ our God." And we say this not once but many times in both Greek and English. But how many of us do this? Do we really commit our whole life to Christ? If we did then we would give up our hatred for one another, our gossip, our discrimination, our cliques, our divisiveness, our meanness, and our lying. You see, if you give up meat and dairy and you continue to do these things then you really haven't really kept the fast and you haven't done anything for yourself or for God.

And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me' (Matthew 25:40). I believe that this verse can apply to the good things that we do to and for others as well as the for the things we say or do to hurt others. Our gift to Christ this year should be to show love and kindness to those around us. This would include the people we live with as well as the stranger we encounter and the acquaintance at work, school, the mall or anywhere else. Saint John the Apostle and Theologian says 'If any one says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen, cannot^[a] love God whom he has not seen' (1 John 4:20).

The gifts we give to God this year should be our love for one another, our kindness towards one another, our honesty, our peacefulness, our charity, and our inclusiveness. All of the presents we buy this Christmas are meaningless if we haven't learned to show genuine love for others. Showing love for God means showing love for our neighbor. If you want to experience the true gift of the birth of Christ, then you must be willing to give your goodness to Him by showing love to those around you. Amen.

GREEK ORTHODOX METROPOLIS OF NEW JERSEY ADDRESSES OPIOID ABUSE M.O.R.E. (METROPOLIS OPIOID RESPONSE EFFORT)

PROGRAM PROVIDES AWARENESS AND HOPE

Westfield, NJ- His Eminence Metropolitan Evangelos of New Jersey, unveiled a new awareness program and informational video about opioid abuse at the 2018 Metropolis Clergy Laity conference held at "**The Venetian**" in Garfield New Jersey. The awareness program is entitled the **M**etropolis **O**pioid **R**esponse **E**ffort (**M.O.R.E**) and His Eminence created a committee from his Metropolitan Council to plan and oversee the initiative.

With the blessings of His Eminence, the committee is comprised of dedicated Clergymen and Lay Orthodox Christians under the chairmanship of Archon H. James Polos, a member of the Metropolitan Council of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of New Jersey and a steward of St. George Parish in Piscataway, NJ. Concerns about opioid abuse which have affected our youth and not only, throughout the Country, even in our parishes and communities were discussed at a meeting of the Metropolitan Council and the decision was made that we must also face reality and deal with this crucial issue which has found its way into the Orthodox Christian home.

His Eminence asked Archon Polos to serve on the committee because of his involvement as a Public Safety Director and County elected official. The committee immediately began work on the program with clear direction from His Eminence who said, "This issue must be brought into the light and our parishioners should not be afraid to talk about this disease or embarrassed to seek help from their parish or this Metropolis. Our Church needs to do MORE to help those afflicted with this disease and we need to reach beyond the borders of our church to enlist help and support for our own who are affected and as our Orthodox faith teaches us, offer help and support

for others in the communities where we live and worship".

With that charge in hand, the committee looked beyond the creation of a standard written encyclical and instead focused on the creation of a video so that His Eminence could speak directly to the people about this very important yet very sensitive and personal issue. A very powerful video was produced which includes a message from His Eminence, true life stories from members of the Greek Orthodox Church and critical information about awareness and response offered bv Dionysios Mihalopoulos, a United States DEA Assistant Special Agent in Charge who was born in Greece and whom presents his views in both Greek and English. Tom and Chrystallo Trachy, share the intimate details of their struggle with their young son who ultimately lost his struggle with addiction. "If sharing and viewing this video can even help one family become more aware of this issue and be able to intervene with their child in time to save their life, it will be well worth the time and tears we have shed to be a part of this important program. My wife and I applaud the Metropolitan for taking a leadership role to bring opioid addiction in our community into the light because it is real and exists in every parish", said Tom Trachy. Father Kosmas Karavellas, Proistamenos of the Greek Orthodox Church of Sts. Constantine and Helen in Annapolis, Maryland added, "I have had to experience the loss of members of our parish to opioid abuse and have had to try and console and minister the loving surviving family members who have to look back each day and wonder if they could have done more. I don't want anyone to have to live through that. The MORE program will go a long way to start the dialogue in our churches."

"We must do all that we can to assist and guide the faithful have to deal with opioid abuse by their loved ones or friends. We must also provide information and access to resources to assist families with identification of abuse and intervention methods. MORE has begun the dialogue but now it will be up to each parish to continue the discussion, challenge the status quo and insure that local experts are brought in to drill down further on the important elements of abuse. The MORE program will better inform and prepare parents and families and most importantly send a strong message to our youngsters about the dangers of addiction to hopefully keep them on the right track before they become addicted. We can and we should all do MORE", said His Eminence, Metropolitan Evangelos.

"This video is one of the most compelling and important works I have seen developed to address opioid abuse in our Greek Orthodox parishes because it encourages people to openly discuss the issue and seek help when necessary from the Church and the other expert resources provided", said DEA Assistant Special Agent in Charge Dionysios Mihalopoulos.

The video is posted on the Metropolis of New Jersey website (https://www.nj.goarch.org/) and parishes throughout the Metropolis and the Archdiocese are encouraged to show it in their parish at various organizational meetings such as GOYA, Philoptochos and PTO. The **M.O.R.E** program and video is simply the first step in what should be an ongoing dialogue at the community level. Follow up discussions and meetings organized by the Priest and parish council at the parish level are also necessary to further the dialogue and the dissemination of important information and resources in each region of the Metropolis. Please help us do **M.O.R.E**.

ΤΑ ΠΑΝΤΑ ΕΙΝΑΙ ΔΥΝΑΤΑ Σ' ΑΥΤΟΝ ΠΟΥ ΠΙΣΤΕΥΕΙ ΣΤΟΝ ΧΡΙΣΤΟ

Στο ξεκίνημα μιας νέας εκκλησιαστικής χρονιάς στον Άγιο Ανδρέα είμαι γεμάτος συναισθήματα δέους και ευχαριστίας καθώς σκέπτομαι όλα όσα έχουμε κάνει και κάνουμε ως κοινότητα. Μερικές φορές τα πράγματα δεν πηγαίνουν όπως θα θέλαμε και αρχίζουμε να αναρωτιόμαστε αν όλα θα πάνε καλά ή αν ο Θεός είναι ακόμη μαζί μας. Αλλά όταν κάνω ένα βήμα πίσω και κοιτάζω την εκκλησία μας και πώς οι άνθρωποι πάντα συνεισφέρουν και πετυχαίνουμε, βλέπω το χέρι του Θεού να εργάζεται για την κοινότητά μας. Τα πράγματα δεν είναι τέλεια και δεν συμβαίνουν χωρίς κάποιον αγώνα, αλλά τελικά γίνονται και πάντα μεγαλώνουμε και μαθαίνουμε στη διαδικασία.

Έτσι, όταν η Βίβλος μας διδάσκει, **«Όλα είναι** δυνατά για αυτόν που πιστεύει στον Χριστό,»

Από τον Πατέρα Ιωάννη Θεοδοσίου είναι μία επιβεβαίωση για όσα γνωρίζω και έχω ζήσει στον Άγιο Ανδρέα. Κάποιες φορές, τα πράγματα φαίνονται ζοφερά αλλά μετά με κάποιο τρόπο φτιάχνουν. Για παράδεινμα, το θαύμα με τα ψάρια και τα ψωμιά, τόσοι άνθρωποι έπρεπε να φάνε και δεν υπήρχε αρκετό φαγητό. Μόνο ένα αγόρι είχε επτά ψάρια και δύο φρατζόλες. Ο Θεός πήρε μία φαινομενικά αδύνατη κατάσταση και την έλυσε ώστε 5000 άτομα να ταϊστούν και να μείνουν και 12 καλάθια φαγητό. Πριν μερικά χρόνια, ο προϋπολογισμός μας κυριολεκτικά διπλασιάστηκε όταν ανοίξαμε το καινούριο κτίριο. Πρέπει να σας πω ότι ανησυχούσαμε. Είπαμε, «Πώς θα καλύψουμε τα έξοδά μας;» Δεν είχαμε τις απαντήσεις, αλλά ξέραμε ότι έπρεπε να συνεχίσουμε την εργασία της εκκλησίας. Δεν θα σας πω ότι δεν ανησυχούσαμε λίγο, αλλά

αισθανόμασταν την παρουσία του Θεού καθώς διαπραγματευόμασταν εκείνους τους ταραγμένους καιρούς και κατά κάποιο τρόπο οι εισφορές διπλασιάστηκαν, το φεστιβάλ μεγάλωσε, και καταφέραμε να πληρώσουμε τους λογαριασμούς. Πιο σημαντικό είναι ότι αυξήθηκαν τα ποιμαντικά μας έργα και η ενορία μας. Για παράδειγμα, επισκεπτόμαστε την Κουζίνα Πίστης στο Dover κάθε μήνα για να δώσουμε φαγητό στους πεινασμένους - και οι κουβέρτες μας, που φτιάχνονται από την ομάδα πλεξίματος τις Τετάρτες, προσφέρονται να θερμάνουν ανθρώπους σε όλο τον κόσμο - τα σάντουΐτς που φτιάχνονται από τους GOYANS διανέμονται σε όσους έχουν ανάγκη στο Newark - η Επιτροπή Thinking of You επισκέπτονται τους συνανθρώπους μας που βρίσκονται σε οίκους ευγηρίας ή είναι στο σπίτι τους, και μπορώ να αναφέρω πολλά άλλα. Ως κοινότητα δεν χάσαμε ποτέ την ελπίδα ότι ο Θεός θα μας βοηθήσει να κάνουμε το έργο Του.

Φέρνω όλα αυτά στην προσοχή σας γιατί στα σπίτια μας έχουμε επίσης πολλές οικονομικές πιέσεις. Επίσης ανησυχούμε για τα παιδιά μας, τα παιδιά μας που φοιτούν σε κάποιο κολλέγιο, τους ηλικιωμένους γονείς μας, και τη δική μας συνταξιοδότηση μια μέρα, και τόσα πολλά ακόμη, αλλά ο Θεός δεν είναι μόνο μέσα στην εκκλησία μας, βρίσκεται και μέσα στα σπίτια μας επίσης. Είναι πάντα εκεί έτοιμος να μας βοηθήσει και να μας καθοδηγήσει όταν δεν ξέρουμε προς τα πού να στραφούμε. Μας δίνει δύναμη να πετύχουμε τους στόχους μας που μας οδηγούν στη σωτηρία. Όταν έχουμε πίστη στον Θεό και εμπιστοσύνη στη δύναμή του θα γίνει ο βοηθός μας σε οτιδήποτε καλό αναλαμβάνουμε να κάνουμε.

Φίλοι μου, τις επόμενες εβδομάδες θα έχουμε τρεις «Κυριακές οικονομικής συνδρομής». Θα συζητήσουμε τί σημαίνει να είσαι καλός οικονόμος της ευλογίας που σας έχει προσφέρει ο Θεός στη ζωή σας. Θα συζητήσουμε το

έργο της σωτηρίας του Θεού στη ζωή μας και γιατί είναι σημαντικό να συμμετέχουμε σε ότι συμβαίνει στην εκκλησία. Σας προσκαλώ εγώ ο ίδιος μαζί με τα μέλη του εκκλησιαστικού συμβουλίου και την Επιτροπή Συνδρομών, να έλθετε να δείτε την καλή δουλειά που γίνεται στην εκκλησία μας. Να κάνετε ερωτήσεις στα μέλη του εκκλησιαστικού συμβουλίου και στην επιτροπή οικονομικών συνδρομών. Να μιλήσετε στους υπεύθυνους των έργων και να ρωτήσετε για την καλή δουλειά που γίνεται στον Άγιο Ανδρέα.

Ελάτε να δείτε με ποιό τρόπο η προσφορά σας σε χρόνο, ταλέντο και χρήματα βοηθά την εκκλησία μας να είναι η Χριστιανική Κοινότητα που ο Χριστός μας έχει ζητήσει να είμαστε. Σας ευχαριστούμε για ότι κάνετε στην εκκλησία μας και για την υποστήριξή σας στο έργο μας. Ζητούμε από εσάς να προσεύχεστε για την εκκλησία μας και την ηγεσία της και για να μας δείξει ο Θεός το δρόμο, όπως προσευχόμαστε και εμείς για όλες τις οικογένειές μας να είναι μαζί σας οι ευλογίες του Θεού νυν και αεί.





What are the 12 Days of Christmas?

The commemoration of the Nativity of our Lord, the Baptism of our Lord, and the events related to them developed over time in the life and practice of the Church. Originally celebrated together on the same day, their celebrations - and the sequence of 12 days in between them - offers the faithful a festal period of great joy.

History

As they designated dates to commemorate events in Jesus' life, the early Christian Church selected January 6 as the date to observe both the birth and baptism of Christ. In the early 4th century it was felt by the church leadership that a distinction should be made between the two observances. They selected Dec 25 to be the date to celebrate the birth of Christ and kept Jan 6 to be the baptism. The selection of Dec 25 also addressed a second issue. The end of December was filled with pagan gatherings and festivities (in honor of the "sun god" as he became victorious over the "god of darkness" as the days slowly began to become longer (the winter solstice). Christians were falling back to pagan temptations with these festivities, thus the church fathers wanted to provide them with their own reason to celebrate. This reason of course became the birth of the Son of God (who made the sun).

Once Christmas Arrives

Our Orthodox Church today celebrates highly and with great festivity and joy! Once Christmas arrives on December 25, we enter a new liturgical period. The major period runs 40 days, from <u>Jesus' Birth</u> to His 40 day <u>Presentation to the Temple</u> (Feb 2). Within these 40 days is some sub-division. From December 25 to January 6, there became a 12-day period from the one major celebration to the next major observance. Thus, we have the "12 days of Christmas" that bridge the birth with the baptism and it became a festal period of time of great joy and celebration. As time progressed January 6 began to be called the "little Christmas."

We have the 7 day Christmas tide which are part of the 12 Days of Christmas, focusing on immediate events up to His naming & Circumcision on the 8th day (January 1). Henceforth, we begin to prepare for the observance of His Baptism when He was 30 years old.

The Baptism of Our Lord

In the Orthodox Church January 6 is officially called the Baptism of our Lord – Theophany (sometimes called simply Epiphany). Theophany means "God's appearance" and Epiphany simply "appearance". On the day of Jesus' baptism, the Holy Trinity was made manifest with the appearance of the dove and the voice that was heard from the sky (Matt 3:13 - 17).

The Catholic Church later in history changed January 6 to be the arrival of the Wise men and made the Baptism to be the Sunday after January 6. In our Orthodox observances, the arrival of the Wise men is combined on the same day as the birth. The Armenian Church still retains January 6 as their Christmas commemoration.

The Twelve Days of Christmas

These 12 days that comprise the "12 days of Christmas" also include other observances on various levels. The first level are events that are directly associated to Christ's birth in the flesh, including the murder of the 14,000 baby boys that Herod ordered when Jesus was born (December 29) and the 8-day naming of Jesus (January 1).

A second level of observances during these 12 days are commemorations of people from the earliest decades of the spread of the Christian faith after the death and resurrection of Christ and Pentecost, such as St. Stephen (one of the first of the 7 deacons) who became the first martyr in Christianity (December 27); and the "seventy" as they are known, these being the 70 apostles that the 12 apostles trained and sent off to travel and preach (January 4).

The third level of commemorations of these 12 days are for those who in later centuries lived and honored Christ in marvelous ways and became saints of the church, such as St Melanie of Rome from the 5th century (December 31), St Basil the Great from the 4th century era (January 1), and St Sylvester, Bishop of Rome also from the 4th century (Jan 2).

In its development over many centuries, the twelve days of Christmas that we celebreate today have become a theological and historical cornucopia of both the life of Christ and the life of the Church through its Christian Witness. What follows is a brief review of the themes from each of the twelve days of Christmas.

Day 1 - Dec 25 - The Nativity in the Flesh of our Lord, God and Saviour Jesus Christ

The Shepherd's worship and the visit of the wise men from the East.

Day 2 - Dec. 26 - Synaxis of the Virgin

Gives Glory and Praise to her, who bore our Lord. Also on the 26th is the commemoration of the Flight into Egypt when an angel warned Joseph of King Herod's plans to kill the children in Bethlehem.

Day 3 - Dec. 27 - St. Stephen the Deacon and 1st Martyr

He was the 1st of the 7 deacons in the "start up" Christian Church (Acts 7) who was stoned to death by the Jews, in 34 A.D. Tradition says that the Theotokos & St. John the Theologian witnessed the stoning.

Day 4 - Dec. 28 - 20,000 Martyrs of Nicomedia (men, women and children)

An event in 302 AD when the wicked Emperor Maximian Hercules, while visiting in Nicomedia learned of the large number of Christians living there and devised a means to get rid of them. It was the days preceding Christmas that he visited so, on Christmas, as the Christians were in church....his soldier's surrounded the church, so no one could leave. The Emperor's envoy gave them a choice to deny Christ and offer sacrifice to the pagan idols, or, be burned to death. The congregation chose death (in fact catechumens were quickly baptized). The soldiers set fire on all 4 sides of the church and the building burned for 5 days The smoke had a fragrant scent and a golden light surrounded the church.

Day 5 - Dec 29 - 14,000 children of Bethlehem (Holy Innocents)

King Herod was furious hearing from the wise men about a new born King in Bethlehem, and ordered that all the babies, 2 yrs and under to be killed in Bethlehem and the surrounding area. This occurred, 1 yr. after the birth. Herod sought out Zachariah's son, also newly born (John, who later became the Baptizer of Jesus) thinking that John would be the "New King". When Zachariah refused to hand over baby John, Herod killed Zachariah as he also killed Simeon who had received Christ as the 40 day old baby Jesus. Angered with the Jews in general – Herod also killed Hyrcanes, their high priest and 70 elders from the Sanhedrin (their council). Herod was so enraged that "someone" would take his position – he also killed own brother and sister, as well as his wife and 3 of his sons! What a crazed man!

Day 6 - Dec 30 - Deacon Timon (one of the 7 Deacons)

Also counted as one of the 70 Apostles who became Bishop in Arabia. He died by crucifixion there in the third century (298AD). On the same day we have the martyrdom of St Anysia from Thessaloniki, born of wealthy and prominent parents. She was orphaned young. She assisted the poor and devoted herself to prayer and fasting. This was the time of Emperor Maximian Hercules again. One of his decrees was that anyone was free to kill Christians when and where they came across them, without trial or sentences. So as Anysia was out in the streets one day, a soldier approached her and confirmed through direct conversation with her, that she was a Christian. He ran her through with a knife under her rib and killed her. This was actually during the days that the pagans had their festival of the sun god (which ultimately became later on in history the date selected for the observance of Christ's Birth).

Day 7 - Dec 31 - Nothing directly connected to Christmas per se, but 2 important figures of the 4th and 5th Century who witnessed greatly to Christian living.

4th Century - Martyr Zoticus, Protector of the Poor A priest in Constantinople, who had a home for the poor and those with infectious diseases. He was a close acquaintance of Emperor Constantine the Great. Constantine's son (Constantine) was jealous of all the money his dad gave to Zoticus to help the poor and the sick, that he tied Zoticus to the behind of a wild ass and he ultimately died of his wounds.

5th Century - Holy Mother Melanie of Rome

Born to wealthy parents, she was forced to marry a young nobleman. After having 2 children she convinced him that they should live as brother and sister. Their 2 children died some time later and they agreed to give their possessions to the poor and the church. They traveled as well to many far away places doing good works along the way. She ultimately became a nun at the Mt. of Olives in Jerusalem.

Sunday After Christmas - Honor is given Joseph the Guardian (i.e. also called Righteous Joseph), David the King (the son of Jesse) and Iakovos, the (stepbrother) of Christ, the 1st bishop of Jerusalem.

Day 8 – Jan 1st - Circumcision and Naming of Jesus

In observance of Jewish Law since the time of Abraham, Joseph and Mary took baby Jesus to the Temple for circumcision and he was also given the name "Jesus", the name announced to Mary at the time of the annunciation by Archangel Gabriel (Luke 1:31). This act of circumcision showed that Jesus took true human flesh upon Himself, (not its resemblance as heretics' would later say about him).

Also on Jan 1st, St. Basil the Great is remembered. Born around 330 A.D. under the reign of Constantine the Great. As an un-baptized person, Basil spent 19 years in Athens studying philosophy, rhetoric, astronomy and other secular disciplines. In his mature years, he was baptized in the Jordan River. He became ultimately Bishop of Caesarea in Cappadocia, died unfortunately young, at age 50. He was a great champion of the faith of moral purity and a great theological mind.

Day 9 - Jan 2nd - St. Sylvester, Bishop of Rome

At the age of 30 he was elected a bishop and served for 20 yrs/died in 335 A.D. He is the one attributed for bringing St. Helen to the Christian faith and ultimately King Constantine himself. He also is credited with "reforming" the Saturday fast (that it would not be a strict fast day) making only Holy Saturday a strict Saturday of fasting.

Jan. 2nd also remembers St. Theodota the mother of the brothers St. Cosmas and Damian, the unmercenary and miracle working doctors.

Day 10 - Jan 3rd - Prophet Malachi (500 yrs. before Christ)

Malachi, is the prophet who prophesied the coming and the mission of John the Baptist (Malachi 3:1). In fact there was no prophet between Malachi and John. Malachi also prophesied about the dread judgment, against ungrateful Israel and against the lawless Hebrew priests.

January 3rd also remembers Martyr Gordius. Born in Caesarea of Cappadocia/an officer in the Roman Army in the reign of Emperor Licinius. After the Army, he went to Sinai (to Mt. Horeb) in contemplation and prayer. He was stabbed to death in 320 A.D.

Day 11 - Jan 4th - Synaxis of the 70 Apostles

This day honors these men, that Jesus also selected that followed the 12 Apostles (Luke 10:1-11), sending them out 2 by 2 going to every city before He himself has to go. This was similar to the Old Testament period in that Moses also had 70 elders that he appointed - Exodus 18:21, 22; 24:1. The 70 Apostles offered valuable service to Christ in those earliest of years as missionaries.

Day 12 - Jan 5th - Hieromartyr Theopemptos, Bishop of Nicomedia and also Martyr Theonas (a pagan magician)

This was the era of Emperor Diocletian who persecuted Christians. When Theopemptos was brought before the Emperor, he responded to the Emperor's request to deny Christ, by quoting Scripture - (Matt 10:28) "Fear not them who kill the body, who are unable to kill the soul." Then he added - do unto my body as you please. Diocletian sent his magician to trick and outdo the bishop...when Theonas saw that even poison would not hurt the Bishop, he converted to Christ! Theopemptos was then beheaded 298 A.D. Theonas was buried alive 298 A.D.

The Glorious Observance of the Baptism of Our Lord

Jan 5 - The Paromony / Preparation (Strict Fast)

Jan 6 - The Baptism Observance

Jan 7 - Synaxis in honor of St John the Prophet, Forerunner and Baptist

Certainly, these 12 days are of great significance and should be known, honored and lived rightly.

REMEMBER YOUR CHURCH THROUGH PLANNED GIVING

The Church is the Body of Christ on earth and carries on His ministry in the world today. Making a Planned Gift to the Church is an opportunity to leave a legacy that strengthens His ministry and expresses our thankfulness to Him.

Through a charitable gift, you can have a significant positive effect on the ministries of the Church and the people whose lives are changed by them. The impact of your gift will be felt for years and generations to come.

A charitable gift may also give you substantial current tax benefits as well as estate tax benefits.

Eternal Light Society was established in 2012 as an organization of all that have made a commitment to support the ongoing ministries of our Church through a planned gift. Regular meetings, luncheons, dinners, newsletters, financial planning seminars, annual artoclasia, annual memorial service and more make up the various programs and benefits of the Eternal Light Society.

As you explore the ways outlined here by which you can support the ministries of the Church, please know that the staff in the church office, the Metropolis and the Archdiocese are available to assist you in any way possible.

Ways to Give

Consider making a gift in one of the following ways:

BEQUEST:

When you include the Church in your testamentary plans, you support its vital mission on a long-term basis. The most common way this is done is through a single bequest. Any type of property, including cash, securities, real estate, works of art and jewelry, and more, may be given to the Church through a bequest. Your generosity will assist in sustaining the faith, ministries and mission of our Orthodox Christian Church in the world today and for generations to come.

TYPES OF BEQUESTS

Specific Bequest This may be a specific dollar amount, a specific piece of tangible or real property, or a stated percentage of your estate.

Residuary Bequest This includes all or a portion of your estate after distribution of other specific bequests, debts, taxes, expenses & fees.

Contingent Bequest Under this type of provision, the Church will only receive the bequest if the primary intention cannot be met or if certain specified circumstances take place.

MATCHING GIFTS

You can make a gift to the Church and multiply the benefit. Many employers will match your charitable gifts. Please check with your employer to see if they have a matching gift program.

GIFTS OF CASH

A gift of cash is by far the easiest and most common way to make a charitable gift to the Church. If you itemize, you are entitled to a charitable deduction based on the full amount of your gift (up to 50% of adjusted gross income). If you cannot use the entire deduction this year, it can be carried forward over the next five years.

GIFTS OF SECURITIES

If you own appreciated securities (held more than 12 months), you can benefit by giving them to the Church: • In most cases, you can avoid payment of capital gains tax that would have been due if you sold the shares; and • If you itemize, you will receive a charitable deduction for the full fair market value of the gift. Gifts of appreciated assets are generally deductible up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income. Any excess can be carried over for five years.

GIFTS OF LIFE INSURANCE

Do you have a life insurance policy that is no longer needed? Rather than giving it up, consider gifting the policy to the Church. Unneeded life insurance often provides a significant method of supporting the Church. If you designate the Church as owner and beneficiary of a paid-up life insurance policy, charitable receive а deduction vou approximately equal to the replacement cost. If the policy is not paid up, you receive an income tax deduction equal to the "cash surrender value" in the year the gift is made. Even term life policies can have significant value. Check with your advisor to find out.

GIFTS OF REAL ESTATE

Gifts of real estate offer you an opportunity to make a significant gift to the Church.

An outright gift of real estate held more than 12 months is the simplest method and is governed by the same basic rules governing securities. When the property has been transferred through a properly executed deed, in most cases, you receive the following benefits:

• You can avoid capital gains tax on the appreciation; and

• You receive an income tax deduction based on the current appraised fair market value. You

can claim a deduction up to 30% of your adjusted gross income in the year of the gift. Any excess may be carried over for up to five years.

Speak to your attorney or tax advisor about the following real estate giving alternatives:

- Real Estate Gifts Used to Fund a Life Income Trust
- A Retained Life Estate

QUALIFIED RETIREMENT PLANS

For many individuals, retirement accounts are a major financial resource and the basis for a financially secure future. Qualified retirement provide substantial benefits plans for accumulating funds for retirement. However, these plans can be subject to both estate and income taxes when funds are distributed or when the plan participant dies. A current distribution directly from a retirement account to the Church can result in significant tax savings. In addition, by naming the Church as the beneficiary of the remainder after your death and/or the death or your spouse, 100 percent of the plan's balance would avoid both income and estate taxes. You can also name the Church as a beneficiary for a portion of the plan along with your spouse and/or children. If you wish to make this type of gift, contact your plan administrator for a "change of beneficiary" form.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITY

A very popular life income arrangement, a charitable gift annuity, is a simple contract between you and the Church. You make a gift and, in return you receive:

• Guaranteed fixed-income payments for you and/or another beneficiary for life. The rate is

based on your age, the number of annuitants and the date of gift. If the gift is made in cash or nonappreciated assets, a portion of the income payment will be tax-free;

- A substantial charitable income tax deduction in the year the gift is made. Any excess can be carried forward;
- Minimization or elimination of capital gains tax on appreciated, long-term property; and
- Because the payout rate on a gift annuity is based on the age of the beneficiary or beneficiaries at the time the gift is made, the guaranteed fixed payout rates are particularly beneficial if you are 55 years or older.

DEFERRED GIFT ANNUITY

Younger donors may find the deferred charitable gift annuity an attractive giving alternative by which you make the gift now and defer receiving payments until a future date which you designate. The annuity rate is based on your age at the time you establish the annuity and the number of years before the first payment.

Benefits: • A substantial charitable income tax deduction in the year the gift is made;

- Deferred annuity payments often deferred until retirement when you will likely be in a lower income tax bracket;
- Annuity payments, a portion of which are taxfree if established with cash or non-appreciated securities, are fixed; and
- Your philanthropy helps to secure the future of the Church.

CHARITABLE LEAD TRUST

The charitable lead trust is a giving opportunity which enables you to make a gift to the Church and transfer assets to your heirs in the future at a reduced gift tax cost. As a lead trust donor, you irrevocably transfer assets, such as cash, securities or other property to a charitable lead trust. The trust is set up for a specific term of years during which you designate the Church as the income beneficiary. When the term of the trust ends, the trust property reverts to your heirs, either outright or in trust. While no current income tax deduction is available for the lead interest, the income is tax-free and a gift and estate tax charitable deduction is available. This program is attractive to individuals desiring to transfer significant assets to heirs and an interest in reducing estate taxes.

Benefits:

• You qualify for a federal gift tax deduction which may vary modestly depending on the timing of your gift;

• For the term of the trust, the Church will receive fixed or variable payments depending on the type of trust. Upon termination of the trust, your designated beneficiaries will receive the trust's assets; and

• Any asset growth occurring within the trust will be distributed to trust beneficiaries free of gift or estate tax.

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUSTS

In a charitable remainder trust you may transfer assets to the trust while retaining the right to receive income for life or a term of years. You can also name beneficiaries to receive an income stream. Benefits:

- A substantial income tax deduction and avoidance of capital gains tax on the transfer of appreciated assets to the trust;
- Income for life for you and/or a loved one; and
- Federal estate and inheritance tax savings.

LIVING WILLS

When doing your estate planning it is common to also include a Living Will dealing with how medical care will be provided if you are unable to give the instructions yourself. The Archdiocese has prepared an Orthodox Living Will that can be filled in and reviewed by your family, doctor and legal advisor. For Orthodox faithful, it is important that the Living Will reflect your Orthodox Christian beliefs. There are many prayers and observances that can give great comfort to the patient and family. If you choose to have your attorney prepare your living will, we urge you to include language in that reflects your Orthodox Christian beliefs.

Merry Christmas! Καλά Χριστούγεννα!

As recalling the birth of precious Lord Jesus, Son of God and universally revered King of Creation, the thought occurred to me that He necessarily had to be humbled to extreme before getting low enough to start understanding man's wicked ways - from scratch: from conception to birth and then start living from an earthly standpoint in order to share His message in a way that man could possibly begin to understand and/or comprehend.

Living among us two millennia ago, Jesus shared examples of universal law through every day events, and graphic examples of how to communicate - with salvation in mind. Yet, even after so many extraordinary measures, we've managed – even as of old - to somehow cut His costly lessons short by twisting and mutilating His Holy Word to promote ungodly personal agendas!

His Father had determined that the only way left to intervene in our death spiral was by way of a personal connection, meaning the Cross, hopefully to orientate us away from animal instincts – by first allowing His beloved Son to be cradled in a stable/bed of hay with dust and waste and odor (*but*, <u>while a child</u>, with two balanced persons of Faith for nurture and guidance).

And, here we are, wanting more – for *personal* gain rather than brotherly affection. **Just**



imagine: Christ Jesus, as King of Kings, willing to be the very least among us – in order to show us the way to our soul, and finally feel safe within realms of His love and grace! This memory's sealed in the soul of mankind whether to realize His presence as dynamically indwelling, or not. Angelic glow is unforgettable: a precious moment to remember because of the way it connects, embracing, summating, anchored with Love in singular wholeness – dynamically focused at heart!

There is even a far greater story here, fueling the Light of the power behind it. Christmas is here to remind us of all we've been given – for free, price prepaid in the name of our All-Holy Mother with the help of heavenly Father's idea: their Feat. I found the pattern of this Christmas scene sealed in my soul - filed away as Part One of The Orthodox Christian heritage: extraordinarily precious - priceless because the cost to bring it to earth in the first place (and then thrive among us against all odds!) was just too high to ever calculate in kind!

How in the world do we <u>appreciate</u> it *right now*? How do we offer even a most meager show of our gratitude for the gift of life that includes a way to word what we're feeling, so unlike how wild animals do with rage, confusion, and/or cunningness? How do we share His gracious understanding without love – especially His unspeakable wisdom – even if only to balance plus a wee bit more? How do we gain what we need to really *thrive* as Jesus taught? Does it actually help to be forgiving; must it hurt so bad, we have to plead for mercy? What does *conscience* tell us - or are we dead to it, too?

How do I learn Your lessons, Lord? Perhaps as a form that enlightens the meaning of meant: "By way of the Gifts" – by way of your personal Presents! (I had to keep listening to get this, keeping my silence intact!) "Everybody has at least one gift: a gift of Life – to resurrect to live to learn: to set a Holy example. Focus on personal, growing; future gets costly when you fail to learn from those who failed. Share a sight with heavenly light – one that I personally gave you: my Child."

Subliming from field to field and beyond, I remembered to follow Jesus; joyfulness joined in. *"Love binds toward added strength*; when *bonded*, to *generate interest."* He pauses and then carries on: *"Feed-links sublime in this field of togetherness, with tones of soul-fueled esteem."* At oneness now, the feeling of Presence became kinship – family now - in awe: strengthening together!

The Word <u>works</u>; it truly does, generating powers of interest forever – by making ends meet with economy in mind, fusing through balance in trade! Gifts of the heart are priceless/ free. They come across as love to work - carefully wrapped with genuine understanding. What comes from within is all that *truly* matters, made to mind; feats proliferate – *together*! Respect, with circumspect: Work. God is mighty – not to smite but reward: as rewording what was otherwise missed – when offered with generous Spirit!

Love brings out the best in us when others (seem to) feel at their worst; balance means always to gain.



Many children have parents serving in the military – far from home, absence of physical presence leaving a terrible void. Every child (of every age – there's one in each of us!) likes to feel as if someone cared enough to offer a little token of love especially for them. As we age, we can get over this – even harden and take heart by serving others, *because* we've gotten so many over the years - with "respites" in between perhaps. Some of us didn't get gifts when we were little; we were lucky to have each other. But we knew the feeling of *not* getting one, without realizing (at a tender age) that the sweetest gifts of all are buried deep in one's heart where no one can take them from us.

With all the above in mind, let's each of us share the price of something we might have bought for ourselves – with a child (or children) who wouldn't be getting any at all without "mine". <u>Think "Me"</u> <u>but act "Other": shower a smile of kindness.</u>

**There's a timesaving blessing attached to this: <u>don't wrap</u>. Toys for Tots people thoughtfully determine appropriate distribution, pairing the gift with aptitudes of the child.

Protecting the Church We Love

September 26, 2018

The ark of the Christian Church sails through troubled waters these days. Mega-scandals have assaulted Christian communities throughout the United States and the world, scandals of a grave dimension, scandals which can only be described as sin, as the pervasiveness of evil, and as the failure of Christians and their leaders to live up to the Church's nature and ministry about which St. Paul wrote in Ephesians.

"...to preach to the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ and to make known to all men the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things, that through the church the manifold wisdom of God might be made known." (Ephesians 3:8-10)

Presently, even the Orthodox Church stands close to the brink of a new schism and that scandal of possible disunity and rancor is yet another signal that all is far from well in the household of the faith.

No Christian community can wash its hands of these scandals and their wanton violations of

servant leadership and pastoral solicitude. For despite our theological differences which are, for us Orthodox Christians, clear and certain, *we are disciples of the same Lord*. There are not "many Christs." Again, St. Paul reminds us, "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is over all, through all, and in all." (Ephesians 4:4-6)

The sin of one brings darkness upon all. Just as we, by human nature, share the consequences of the ancestral sin of Adam, so too, the sins and scandals associated with various ecclesial bodies today must be "owned" by **all** Christians. The burden rests on all our hearts. We can be complicit, if even by apathy or mediocrity—or denial. None can run from the great betrayal. How do we, as holders of the Apostolic faith, protect the *koinonia*—the communion of belief—from those forces seeking to destroy it, dilute it, or compromise it. We must not look to an institution or an organization. It is pointless to see the real problem somewhere "out there." **The fact is, we must look to our own**

hearts, it is there that the deceiver seeks to capture our attention (logismoi) and to spin his lethal yarn.

Our holy Father, St. Silouan of Mt. Athos, provides guidance in his writings for safeguarding Christ's Church. He wrote, "All our troubles come from pride. If we would have humility, then God would show us all His secrets because He loves us. As the Lord said, "Learn from Me, for I am meek and lowly of heart, and you will find rest unto your souls."

To learn from Christ is to learn to discipline and transform our egos—the seat of pride. Ego is the source of spiritual unhappiness, dryness, and a nagging feeling of estrangement from God. Egotism can also be a contributing factor to unrest and scandal in the Church. God revealed to Schema-Monk Silouan that the root of all human sin is pride/self-centeredness. He taught Silouan that God is humility, and that the man who would "put on" Christ, the man who would be truly happy in life, the Church that would be the most fulfilled, **must learn the way of the humble**.

Because each believer can yield to egotism and control, the Church, the ekklesia, can itself become tarnished and lose its purpose and focus. Humility is certainly not a fashionable or popular virtue in our "me first—go drives all—I'm so impressed with myself" culture. Yet it is the greatest antidote to living with an unbridled sense of one's own importance in the struggle of my will versus God's will for me. Humility is the proper spirit for Bishops, priests, and lay persons to have if they want to stave off the evil one from causing scandal, disunity, or schism. Left unchecked, these can end in emptiness of soul, being spiritually dead. We begin to listen to the sordid voices of this world and get caught up in the vortex. How do we get to that humble place?

In his book **The Mountain of Silence**, Kyriacos Markides quotes Geronda Maximos, the Athonite Elder by saying, "When human beings completely obliterate their own egotism and reach for union with God, then whatever they wish is what God wishes, and it is given."

To find these dangers to our soul and therefore to the Church, **we must first search our heart and soul honestly**. St. Silouan wrote that "Pride and self-centeredness entail every disaster and downfall, grace departs, the heart grows cold, prayer is feeble."

Is this true in *my* life? Have I allowed pride and ego to take over in my person, in my marriage, my family and relationships, in my work in the world? In the battle of wills between me and God (the definition of pride), do I seek to prevail or to surrender? Do I demand the control of my life?

These questions require tough discernment. A doctor can't treat a disease without a diagnosis. Pride and ego cannot be healed without first recognizing them, honestly, in our souls and in our daily living—and in our Church.

Second, embrace the pain. Make no mistake, the effort to transform pride/ego into genuine humility will go against our natural impulses. The ego is a greedy and voracious thing. Once we submit to it, once we give it what it wants, it wants more and more of us. Redirecting our will to the will of God goes against that natural and intuitive reaction of our ego towards the self. After all, it is easier **not** to live as a Christian than to live as Christ lived. Yet St. Silouan assures us that "keeping our souls in hell" is the true path to humility. We need to know that our discipleship will cost us.

As St. Silouan wrote of Adam's battle with God, "There is an aching and deep regret in the soul. Adam pined on earth and wept bitterly, and the earth was not pleasing to him. He was heartsick for God and this was his cry, "My soul wearies for the Lord and I seek Him in tears."

Lived as a destiny everyday, our personal ego, our battle to wrest control from God rather than surrender to Him, will supply us with an endless font of tears and regret.

Lastly, never give up hope. St. Silouan suffered acutely in the spiritual and psychological struggle for some 15 years, but he never gave up. That was the key. He kept focused on the struggle, on the process of personal spiritual change. He kept hope in his suffering because Christ suffered. Hope was a way out of pain, a way out of despair and discouragement, a way out of spiritual death and its trap of the ego. No matter what you find in your soul-searching or how painful taming your inflated ego and embracing the way of the humble Christ can be, **hold on, always hold on.** Pray for yourself and pray for the Church that it, too, might be faithful to its nature and call to service—not power and control; to spiritual truth and authentic asceticism—not the creation of comfortable selfserving theories of belief. The Lord Jesus promised "rest for our souls," and he will deliver on His promise! May the Humble Lord touch our hearts and the heart of His Church with His abiding peace and humble way.

CHRISTMAS TIME 2018! "CELEBRATING DIVERSITY WITH OUR CHILDREN"


Nativity Fast Lenten Study




