

The Power of Pentecost

Christos Anesti! Christ is Risen!

Once there was a man who decided to buy a computer, and money was no object for him. So, he decided to by the best computer he could find. It had all of the bells and whistles you could imagine. The fastest processor, the biggest hard drive, sound card, screen, etc. This machine was state of the art. And after he got it home, he was very



Now you might be saying to yourself, why is Father John relating a story about a man who forgot to plug in his computer? And you know what? This is a good question because this story relates to the major holiday known as Pentecost and it is the day we celebrate the birth of the Orthodox Faith and the Orthodox Church in the year 33. As we hear in the epistle reading on the 50th day following the resurrection of Jesus the 12 apostles were



gathered along with about 100 other people including the Virgin Mary. Christ told them that he would be sending his Spirit to descend upon them and fill them with the gifts of the Grace of God. And this is how it happened. As the apostles where assembled in one place, a rush of wind came into the house and the Holy Spirit filled each of them, and tongues of flame rested upon their heads

giving them the power to speak in all languages and to be understood by all people. And there were many there who witnessed what had happened and they became confused because they understood what was being spoken by the apostles. And they understood them even though they did not speak the same language of the Apostles. Now you may be asking yourself, how do we know that this really happened? Well the Bible tell us that this event attracted so much attention that people came from all around, and 3000 thousand people were baptized on that day. This account of what happened at Pentecost can be found in the first two chapters of the book of Acts in the New Testament.

On the day of Pentecost, the Apostles received the power of the Holy Spirit and this is the power of God. It gave them the power to heal, the power to teach, the power to prophesy, and the power to perform all kinds of miracles. But the most important power that the Holy Spirit gave them was the power to love. And I am not talking about the love that we see on

t.v, in the soap operas, and in the movies. That love is self-serving and superficial. The power to love that the Holy Spirit gave the apostles is true love that never expects anything in return, and it lasts forever. It is the same love that Christ showed us when he died on the cross and Resurrected so that we would have everlasting life with him. This love never grows old, fades away, or dies, but it lasts forever. This everlasting love is the true power of Christianity which was given to the apostles on the day of Pentecost.

Now you might be asking yourselves "how can I get this power?" Well, believe it or not you already have it. Yes, we already have the Gifts of the Grace of the Holy Spirit. On the day we were christened we received 3 of the 7 sacraments of the Church. First, we received the sacrament of Baptism, second, we received the sacrament of Chrismation, and third we received the sacrament of Holy Communion. And it was when we were chrismated that we received the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the power to love as God intended it to be.

The problem is that we run the risk of becoming like the man with the computer. The power is sitting there for us to use but we cannot access it. We cannot access it because we are not plugged into the power of prayer. It is our prayer life which gives us the access to the gifts of the Holy Spirit, which are already in us and were given to us when we were chrismated.

We should not be like the man who could not access the power of his computer because it was not plugged in, rather we should plug into the power of prayer. If we take a few opportunities throughout each day, in the morning in the afternoon, dinner time, and in the evening, to be quiet and to pray to God, we will experience the power of the Holy Spirit and the power of his love. Even these short connections with God will connect us with His power, and once you have experienced His power and His love then it will be radiated through you and others will experience God's love as he designed it to be experienced through you.

GREAT AND HOLY PASCHA 2019

My Beloved in the Lord, Χριστός Ανέστη! Christ is risen!

Today we have been rescued from the ancient curse of death and new life has been granted to all of humanity. For our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ has risen from the dead, destroyed the gates of Hades, and has freed us from corruption, thus confirming that He is the Life and the Light of the world. Hades was mortified when it saw Christ, the King of all, and he shuddered in His very presence.

Whereas before "all of creation trembled when it saw you hanging on the tree", now all creation rejoices as it witnesses you breaking the gates of hell.



To those who have been captives in Hades, they have been freed by Him who liberates all humanity. To those who are dead, they have been raised by Him who is the Source of Life. To those who are in darkness, they have been illumined with Christ's divine Light. To those who are in anguish, they have been comforted with His sublime presence. To those who are sinful, they have been redeemed by Him who suffered for our sake. All humanity that has gone before us has received a taste of His everlasting Kingdom through His resurrection.

The resurrection of Christ not only affects those who have died, but also has significance for those of us who still live. His resurrection is a confirmation that we too will rise at the end of times and will have the opportunity to live with Him in Paradise. We are offered this magnificent gift from Christ through His Cross, but it necessitates that we too carry our cross for our Lord tells us, "If anyone wishes to come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Matthew 16:24). Let us, therefore, run towards Him in our daily lives and "…set aside all the cares of life" so that, when God calls us to Him, we may partake in the Christ's resurrection; for as St. Paul says, "For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall surely be united with Him in a resurrection like His" (Romans 6:5).

It is with these thoughts in mind, my dearly beloved in the Lord, that I implore you, as you celebrate Christ's resurrection, the feast of feasts, to also remember all the gifts our Lord has given to us and to continue sharing these gifts with others. The resurrection of Christ is by no means the end of our prayer life or of our charity, rather it is the beginning of a New Day and a New Life. In this new beginning, we have been given spiritual strength in Christ's resurrection. In this new beginning we have been imbued with the Light of Christ so that we too may share it with our friends, our neighbors, and the world. In this new beginning we have been given additional gifts to share our faith and to thereby bring people closer to Christ by living our faith. Let us never cease to do the work our Lord has commanded us so that, when we are called forth to judgement at the Common Resurrection, we may experience the inimitable joy of the Kingdom of God.

It is my sincerest hope and prayer that as we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord, God, and Savior, Jesus Christ that we spread the good news of His dominion over death to the world. May our Risen Lord bless each and every one of you and your families with an abundance of renewed faith and health so that we may exclaim with the utmost joy, "Christ is risen from the dead, by death trampling down upon death and to those in the tombs he has granted life."

«Εί δέ Χριστὸς οὐκ ἐγήγερται, ματαία ἡ πίστις ὑμῶν» (Α΄ Κορ. 15, 17)

Άγαπητοί ἐν Χριστῷ ἀδελφοί,

Χριστός Άνέστη!

Σύμπασα ἡ κτίση, «Οὐρανός τε καί γῆ καί τά καταχθόνια», ἑορτάζει, πανηγυρίζει καί εὐφραίνεται μέ τό συγκλονιστικό, ἐλπιδοφόρο καί σωτήριο μήνυμα πού ἀνέτειλε ἀπό τό κενό μνημεῖο τοῦ Ἀναστάντος Χριστοῦ. Ὁ «δι΄ ἡμᾶς τούς ἀνθρώπους καί διά τήν ἡμετέραν σωτηρίαν» ἐνανθρωπίσας Ἰησοῦς, ποὺ θανατώθηκε ἐπάνω στόν σταυρό, διαπέρασε τή φθορά τοῦ θανάτου, νίκησε τή θνητότητα καί κατήργησε τή δύναμη τοῦ διαβόλου πού ταλαιπωροῦσε γιά αἰῶνες τό ἀνθρώπινο γένος. Ἡ θυσία Του, πού προσφέρθηκε ὡς «λύτρον ἀντί πολλῶν», ἐξασφάλισε στήν ἀμαυρωθεῖσα ἀνθρώπινη φύση τή σωτηρία της.

Ό «Μονογενής Υἰός καί Λόγος τοῦ Θεοῦ» σαρκώθηκε γιά νά πεθάνει, τονίζει μέ ἔμφαση ὁ ἄγιος Ἀθανάσιος, καθώς μόνον μέ τόν θάνατο Του ἦταν δυνατή ἡ Ἀνάσταση. Χωρίς τήν Ἀνάσταση, ἡ χριστιανική πίστη θά ἦταν μάταιη καί ἀνωφελής, χωρίς κανένα οὐσιαστικό περιεχόμενο, ὅπως ὑπογραμμίζει ὁ Ἀπόστολος τῶν ἐθνῶν Παῦλος, γράφοντας «Εἰ δέ Χριστός οὐκ ἐγήγερται, ματαία ἡ πίστις ὑμῶν». Καί ὁ ἱερός Αὐγουστῖνος ἐπεξηγεῖ: «Δέν εἶναι καθόλου γιά μας μεγάλο, ἄν πιστεύουμε ὅτι ὁ Χριστός πέθανε. Αὐτό τό πιστεύουν καί οἱ εἰδωλολάτρες. Καί οἱ Ἰουδαῖοι. Καί ὅλοι οἱ ἀμαρτωλοί. Ὅλοι τό πιστεύουν, ὅτι πέθανε. Ἡ πίστη τῶν χριστιανῶν εἶναι ἡ Ἀνάσταση τοῦ Χριστοῦ. Αὐτὸ εἶναι γιά μᾶς τό μεγάλο. Πιστεύουμε ὅτι ὁ Χριστός ἀναστήθηκε».

Ή Άνάσταση τοῦ Κυρίου ἀποτελεῖ τόν ἀκρογωνιαῖο λίθο πάνω στόν ὁποῖο οἰκοδομεῖται ἐδῶ καί δύο χιλιάδες χρόνια ἡ χριστιανική πίστη. Μέ αὐτήν ἀναζωογονήθηκε ἡ πεπτωκυῖα ἀνθρώπινη φύση καί ἀπέκτησε τή δυνατότητα τῆς ἀνάστασης καί τῆς συμμετοχῆς της στήν ἐπουράνια Βασιλεία. Ὁ Χριστός ὅχι μόνο ἀναστήθηκε ὁ ἴδιος, ἀλλά «συνεγείρας τόν Προπάτορα ἡμῶν», ἀνέστησε ὅλο τό ἀνθρώπινο γένος καί ἀπεδείχθη «ἀρχηγός τῆς ζωῆς», τέλειος Θεός, ἀπεσταλμένος ἐκ τοῦ Πατρός γιά τή σωτηρία τοῦ ἀνθρωπίνου γένους. Τό μήνυμα τῆς Άναστάσεως τοῦ Χριστοῦ εἶναι τό πλέον αἰσιόδοξο καί χαρμόσυνο γιά ὅλη τήν ἀνθρωπότητα, πού προσπαθεῖ νά ἰσορροπήσει ἀνάμεσα στό θαῦμα τῆς ζωῆς καί στό μυστήριο τοῦ θανάτου. Εἶναι τό κατ' ἐξοχήν μήνυμα τῆς ἀγάπης τοῦ Θεοῦ στόν ἄνθρωπο. Ὁ Χριστιανός πλέον γνωρίζει ὅτι, μέ τή δύναμη τοῦ Ἀναστάντος, θά ἀναστηθεῖ μία ἡμέρα καί αὐτός καί θά λάβει νέο σῶμα ἄφθαρτο, ἔνδοξο καί ἀθάνατο, πεποίθηση πού ἀποτυπώνεται καί στό Σύμβολο τῆς Πίστεώς μας μέ τό «προσδοκῶ ἀνάστασιν νεκρῶν καί ζωήν τοῦ μέλλοντος αἰῶνος».

Άγαπητοί μου άδελφοί,

Ός Ἐπίσκοπος καί πνευματικός σας πατέρας, εὔχομαι ὁλόψυχα σέ ὅλους καί στόν καθένα ξεχωριστά, ἡ πίστη στήν Ἀνάσταση τοῦ Κυρίου μας νά γίνει ἡ γέφυρα διά τῆς ὁποίας θά μετέλθουμε ἀπό τά πρόσκαιρα στά αἰώνια, ἀπό τά φθαρτά στά ἄφθαρτα, ἀπό τά γήινα στά ἐπουράνια. Τό ἀνέσπερο φῶς τῆς Ἀναστάσεως ἄς καταυγάζει τή σκέψη μας, ἄς φωτίζει τόν νοῦ μας καί ἄς στηρίζει τήν ὕπαρξή μας. Ἅς προσέλθουμε «λαμπαδηφόροι» στό Κοινό Ποτήριο τῆς ἀναστάσιμης θείας Εὐχαριστίας, γιά νά προγευθοῦμε τή σωτηρία καί τήν κατά χάριν θέωσή μας. Ἅς καινουργήσουμε τίς σκέψεις, τά ὄνειρα καί τίς ἐπιθυμίες μας μέσα στό φῶς τῆς Ἀνάστασης καί τῆς ἀληθινῆς καί ἀναφαίρετης χαρᾶς πού προσφέρει ὁ νικητής καί θριαμβευτής τοῦ θανάτου, ὁ Ἀναστάς Ἰησοῦς.

HIS EMINENCE METROPOLITAN ELPIDOPHOROS

Metropolitan Elpidophoros of Bursa Elected Unanimously Archbishop of America

NEW YORK – The Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America announces to the faithful the election of His Eminence Metropolitan Elpidophoros of Bursa as the new Archbishop of America. The official announcement of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in translation follows below:

ECUMENICAL PATRIARCHATE

Announcement of May 11, 2019

Today, Saturday May 11 2019, the Holy and Sacred Synod, continuing its work, proceeded to fill the vacated seat of the Archdiocese of America following the voluntary resignation of its shepherd, His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios Geron of America.

Therefore, following the suggestion, permission and exhortation of His-All Holiness, the holy synodical members upon invocation of the Holy Spirit, duly casted their votes and unanimously elected as **Archbishop of America His Eminence Metropolitan Elpidophoros of Bursa**, Abbot of the Holy Monastery of the Holy Trinity in Halki and Professor of the Theological School of the Aristoteleian University of Thessaloniki.

ΚΑΘΕ ΗΜΕΡΑ ΕΙΝΑΙ ΤΟ ΠΡΩΙΝΟ ΤΟΥ ΠΑΣΧΑ

Από τον Πατέρα Ιωάννη Θεοδοσίου

Χριστός Ανέστη! Όταν σκεπτόμαστε την Ανάσταση του Χριστού, σκεπτόμαστε τον Κύριό μας σε όλη Του τη δόξα να ανασταίνεται από τον τάφο μία Κυριακή πρωί. Σκεπτόμαστε την ισχύ Του που είναι πάνω από τον θάνατο. Επίσης σκεπτόμαστε που είπε, «Εγώ ειμί η οδός και η αλήθεια και η ζωή.» Ο Κύριός μας είναι τόσο θαυμαστός σε όλα τα έργα Του που εν σοφία εποιησεν. Αυτός δημιούργησε τα πάντα. Όταν σκέπτομαι την ωραιότητα και τα θαυμάσια του Κυρίου μας θυμάμαι όλα τα θαύματά Του και τις ιάσεις, και τις διδασκαλίες Του που άλλαξαν τη ζωή μας.

Ένα τέτοιο θαύμα είναι η ανάσταση της κόρης του Ιάειρου. Μία πολυάσχολη ημέρα, ανάμεσα στα πλήθη ανθρώπων, ένας άνδρας ονομαζόμενος Ιάειρος, ο οποίος ήταν άρχων της συναγωγής, έπεσε στα πόδια του Ιησού και Τον ικέτεψε να έλθει στο σπίτι του, όπου βρισκόταν η δωδεκάχρονη μοναχοκόρη του που πέθαινε. Πριν προλάβει να αποκριθεί στον Ιάρειο ο Ιησούς, περιστοιχισμένος από ανθρώπους που σπρώχνονταν, μία γυναίκα που έπασχε από αιμορραγίες πολλά χρόνια, άπλωσε το χέρι της και άγγιξε το στρίφωμα του ενδύματός Του. Η δύναμη του Κυρίου θεράπευσε τη γυναίκα. Ο Ιησούς ήθελε να μάθει για αυτήν που Τον άγγιξε. Όταν η γυναίκα κατάλαβε ότι γνώριζε για την ίασή της, έπεσε στα πόδια Του και αποκάλυψε σε όλους ότι αυτή έναι που γιατρεύτηκε από τον Ιησού. Και τότε είπε προς αυτήν, «Κόρη, να χαίρεσαι· η πίστη σου σε έκανε καλά. Πήγαινε τώρα εν ειρήνη.» Εκείνη τη στιγμή, ένας υπηρέτης από το σπίτι του Ιάειρου, του είπε «η κόρη σου είναι νεκρή, μην

απασχολείς τον Κύριο πια.» Αλλά όταν τον άκουσε ο Ιησούς, του απήντησε, «Μη φοβάσαι· μόνο πίστευε, και θα γίνει καλά.» Όταν ο Ιησούς έφτασε στο σπίτι, πήρε τον Πέτρο, τον Ιάκωβο και τον Ιωάννη και τους γονείς του κοριτσιού μέσα στο δωμάτιο που ήταν ξαπλωμένο το κορίτσι, της έπιασε το χέρι και είπε, «Μικρό κορίτσι, σήκω!» Και τότε το πνεύμα της επέστρεψε και αναστήθηκε!

Ο κόσμος που πριν κορόιδευε τον Ιησού, που έλεγε ότι το κορίτσι θα γινόταν καλά, πρέπει να θαύμασαν και να δόξασαν τον Θεό. Η πίστη τους ήταν σε κώμα, (ένας βαθύς ύπνος που μοιάζει με θάνατο), αλλά ήταν σαν να μίλησε σε όλους όταν μίλησε στο κοριτσάκι διατάζοντάς τη να σηκωθεί. Είναι σαν να διέταξε την πίστη τους να εγερθεί και να γίνει μία ζωντανή και ακμαία πίστη. Η αλήθεια είναι ότι πράγματι μιλά σε όλους μας όταν διατάζει μία αδρανή και ασθενή πίστη μέσα στον καθένα μας, να αναστηθεί.

Η πίστη μας πρέπει να αναστηθεί μέσα στον καθένα μας όπως και στις μυροφόρες, που σηκώθηκαν νωρίς την Κυριακή το πρωί, την Τρίτη μέρα μετά την σταύρωση του Κυρίου τους. Σηκώθηκαν και πήγαν στον τάφο για να αλείψουν με μύρο το σώμα του Κυρίου τους, όπως άρμοζε, και προς έκπληξή τους βρήκαν ότι ο βράχος είχε κυλήσει και ο τάφος ήταν κενός. Άρχισαν να ψάχνουν και να κλαίνε, και αναρωτιόνταν τί συνέβη στον Κύριο. Τότε η Μαρία η Μαγδαληνή μίλησε σε κάποιον που νόμιζε ότι ήταν κηπουρός. Και μόνο όταν ο Χριστός την αποκάλεσε με το όνομά της γύρισε το κεφάλι και Τον αναγνώρισε. Τότε φώναξε

«Αγαπημένε μου Δάσκαλε». Όλα πλέον έβγαζαν νόημα και αυτή όπως και οι άλλες μυροφόρες κατανόησαν και πίστεψαν στην Ανάσταση του Χριστού.

Κάθε Κυριακή είναι η γιορτή της Ανάστασης του Χριστού στην Ορθόδοξη Εκκλησία, αλλά πρέπει να ζούμε την κάθε ημέρα σαν μια ευκαιρία να θυμόμαστε και να εορτάζουμε την Ανάσταση του Κυρίου. Ένας συγγραφέας έγραψε κάποτε για την Ανάσταση, «Και εσύ επίσης, Και εσύ αναστήθηκες. Αφησες τον ύπνο του θανάτου. Κι εσύ αναστήθηκες, όλο ζωή και δόξα. Και αυτή η δόξα της ανάστασης ύπταται πάνω από όλα τα πρωινά μας.... Κύριε, μην αφήσεις καμμία καινούργια ημέρα να έλθει να φωτίσει τη ζωή μου χωρίς να πάει η σκέψη μου στην Ανάστασή Σου, και χωρίς να αναχωρήσω, με την σκέψη μου, με τα αρώματά μου τα φτωχά, για τον κενό τάφο στον Κήπο.

Αφού είναι ο Χριστός που αναστήθηκε που έρχεται σε μένα κάθε μέρα την αυγή. Ό,τι δυσκολίες μπορεί να υπάρξουν, όποιοι κίνδυνοι, η κάθε μία από τις ημέρες μου θα αρχίζουν εκθαμβωτικά εάν θυμάμαι – με όλη μου την ψυχή και όλη μου την σκέψη – ότι ο Σωτήρας μου νίκησε τις δυνάμεις του κακού και του θανάτου. Η πρώτη μου πράξη πίστεως, κάθε πρωί, θα είναι μία πράξη πίστης στον

τελικό Σου θρίαμβο.» (Μέσα στην Παρουσία Σου, από τον Πατέρα Lev. Gillet, σελίδα 141, 1977, SVS Press). Κάθε ημέρα πρέπει να είναι για εμάς άλλος ένας θρίαμβος της πίστης που προστίθεται στις πολλές νίκες που κερδήθηκαν όσο ζούσε ο Χριστός πάνω στη γη· σαν την ανάσταση της κόρης του Ιάειρου.

Η πίστη μας πρέπει να ξαναξυπνήσει όπως σηκώθηκαν νωρίς το πρωί οι μυροφόρες γυναίκες και όπως το κοριτσάκι του Ιάειρου επέστρεψε στη ζωή. Ο Χριστός αναστήθηκε νωρίς το πρωί το Πάσχα για να αναστηθούμε και εμείς μία ημέρα.

Φίλοι μου εν Χριστώ, προσεύχομαι η εμπειρία της Ανάστασης του Κυρίου μας να είναι για όλους μας ένα γεγονός που θα αλλάξει την ζωή μας, που θα μεταμορφώσει την κάθε ημέρα της ζωής μας σε μία γιορτή του αναστηθέντα Κυρίου μας και μία καθημερινή αναγέννηση της πίστης μας στον Θεό. Ω Κύριε, προσευχόμαστε να αναστήσεις την πίστη μας όπως ανέστησες την κορούλα του Ιάειρου και να μας βοηθήσεις να αλλάξουμε την ζωή μας και να ζήσουμε όπως βοήθησες την Μαρία Μαγδαληνή. Αμήν

As well on Sunday June 2nd after the service we will re-present the plaques to the honorees in front of our community. We would like to thank them all for their services and contributions to the success of our ministries.

COMMUNITY HONOREE EVANGELIA PAPASTAVROU

Evangelia was born January 2, 1930 in Argos Orestikon, Kastoria. She along with her husband Naoum, daughter Stavroula (age 10) and son Stavros (age 1) emigrated to the US in 1967.

Evangelia has always been a devout Christian. She was active in several local Greek Orthodox parishes—Ss. Constantine & Helen, Orange, 1967-1972; St. George, Clifton, 1972-1980 and in St. Andrew since the early 1980s.

academics, as well as high school and community activities. She also finds great joy and satisfaction with her religious education students during Sunday morning classes, which she has been teaching for 20 years.

When her mother eventually developed Alzheimer's, she set up a wonderful and loving live-in aide for her mother so that she could live out the rest of her life with dignity and self-respect. She and her brother would visit their mother twice a year in Loutraki, to ensure that her mother knew how important she was to them, and how much they loved her and appreciated her for all that she had done for them and for the sacrifices that she had made for them. Our Mother of the Year is Maria Daniskas.



The Holy Spirit Is God

Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Toronto (Canada)

Our Church believes that the Holy Spirit is God. He is the third Person of the Holy Trinity. He is equal to the other two Persons of the Holy Trinity, the Father and the Son. This belief of our Church is based on both the Holy Scriptures and on Holy Tradition.

In the Old Testament it is mentioned that the Prophet Isaiah talked with the Holy Spirit (Isaiah, 6:1-10). This is confirmed when St. Paul says, "Well spoke the Holy Spirit by Isaiah the Prophet to our Fathers" (Acts, 28:25). A similar passage is found in the Prophet Jeremiah. And again we have the witness of St. Paul, who confirms that "the Holy Spirit" speaks (Hebrews, 10:15-17). There are many more similar passages in the Old Testament that bear witness that the Holy Spirit is God.

In the New Testament many passages bear witness.

When Christ was resurrected, He said to His Disciples, "Go you and teach all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit" (Mark, 16:15). Here the Holy Spirit is equal to the Father and to the Son. There is no doubt that He is God. Saint Peter categorically calls the Holy Spirit, "God" (Acts, 5:4). And St. Paul characteristically says, "Now the Lord is that Spirit" (II Corinthians, 3:17). In very many other places in the New Testament the Divinity of the Holy Spirit is revealed. It is not necessary, however, to mention them all here.

In opposing the heresy of Macedonios against the Holy Spirit, the Second Ecumenical Council, which took place at Constantinople in the year 381 A.D., produced the eighth article of the Creed, which states, "... and [I believe] in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of Life, Who proceeds from the Father, and is worshipped and glorified together with the Father

and the Son, Who spoke through the Prophets." This is a teaching that is absolutely based on the Holy Scriptures and Holy Tradition. Pay attention to these words: "worshipped and glorified together with the Father and the Son." Who is worshipped and glorified? God. God alone. And so, since the Holy Spirit is worshipped and glorified together with the Father and the Son, He is also True God.

Many opposed this Orthodox belief. In the Fourth Century, it was Macedonios and his followers. They said that the Holy Spirit is not uncreated God, as is the Father and the Son. They said that He is a creation, and therefore no different from all other created beings; no created being is God, and so the Holy Spirit cannot be God. This arbitrary opinion cannot be supported by Holy Scripture or Holy Tradition.

In our times there are others who are worse than the followers of Macedonios. The Jehovah's Witnesses deny the existence of the Holy Spirit. The worst is that they call themselves students of the Holy Scriptures. Even a brief glimpse at the Holy Scriptures would show them not only the existence of the Holy Spirit but also His Divinity.

With the use of the word spirit, The Holy Scriptures frequently refer to the other two Persons of the Holy Trinity, the Father and the Son. Why? As Theodoritos the Compiler says, "To show us that the divine nature of the Three Persons is one and the same, spiritual and immaterial, unembodied and indescribable." And he adds, "Nevertheless, the Spirit is Holy, and only the Third Person is called the Holy Spirit."

There is much to be said in interpreting the many passages of the Holy Scriptures that refer to the Holy Spirit. However, it is not our intention to interpret all of these passages here. But we do find it necessary to look at a particular passage that is often misunderstood. St. Mark writes, "All sins shall be forgiven unto the sons of men, and blasphemies wherewithsoever they shall blaspheme. But he that shall blaspheme against the Holy Spirit has never forgiveness but is in danger of eternal damnation" (Mark, 3:28-29). Blasphemy against the Holy Spirit is an unforgivable sin. The problem is that this passage seems to forgive blasphemy against the Son but not against the Holy Spirit. The passage can be very easily misunderstood to mean that the Holy Spirit is superior to the Son. The correct interpretation, as it is given to us by the Church Fathers, is this: blasphemy against the Holy Spirit is the denial by man out of hatred of God's power to save him. Even more simply, the man who does not believe that the grace of God—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit—can save him, closes his heart to the actions of the Holy Spirit; he does not accept Grace. He does not proceed to repentance. He fights against the sanctifying and saving act of God. He creates within himself a sorrowful and incurable condition.

"Heavenly King and Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, Who are everywhere and fill all things, come and abide in us and cleanse us from every stain and save, O Good One, our souls." Relieve every man of sorrowful incurable non-repentance and the denial of Your sanctifying and saving action. Make us aware of our shortcomings and sins. Grant us faith in the Trinitarian God, sincere repentance, a returning to You. Grant us the salvation of our Souls and that of all the world.

Περί του Αγίου Πνεύματος

Χριστιανική Φοιτητική Δράση

Άρθρο 8° . «Καὶ εἰς τὸ Πνεῦμα τὸ Ἅγιον, τὸ κύριον, τὸ ζωοποιόν, τὸ ἐκ τοῦ Πατρὸς ἐκπορευόμενον, τὸ σὺν Πατρὶ καὶ Υἰῷ συμπροσκυνούμενον καὶ συνδοξαζόμενον, τὸ λαλῆσαν διὰ τῶν προφητῶν».

Το όγδοο άρθρο του Συμβόλου της αγίας μας Πίστης αναφέρεται στο τρίτο πρόσωπο της Θεότητας, για να συμπληρωθεί η αλήθεια γύρω από την Αγία Τριάδα. Το τρίτο, λοιπόν, πρόσωπο της Θεότητας είναι το Πνεύμα το Άγιο.

Από τα χαρακτηριστικά «Άγιον, Κύριον, Ζωοποιόν», με τα οποία μας παρουσιάζει το Πνεύμα το Σύμβολο, φαίνεται καθαρά πως η πίστη μας στο Άγιο Πνεύμα είναι πίστη σε Θεό. Όπως δηλαδή πιστεύουμε, ότι ο Πατήρ είναι Θεός, όπως πιστεύουμε, ότι ο Υιός είναι Θεός, ομοίως πιστεύουμε και ομολογούμε, ότι και το Πνεύμα είναι Θεός. Άγιο λέμε τον Πατέρα, Άγιο και τον Υιό, Άγιο και το Πνεύμα. Κύριο αναγνωρίζουμε τον Πατέρα, Κύριο και τον Υιό, Κύριο και το Πνεύμα. Πηγή ζωής δεχόμαστε τον Πατέρα, Ζωοδότη τον Υιό, Ζωοποιό και το Άγιο Πνεύμα. Επομένως, όπως είναι Θεός ο Πατήρ, Θεός και ο Υιός, έτσι Θεός είναι και το Άγιο Πνεύμα. Λέμε και στην Εκκλησία μας· «Άγιος ο Θεός, ο άναρχος, Άγιος Ισχυρός ο Υιός ο συνάναρχος, Άγιος Αθάνατος το Πνεύμα το Άγιον». Την ίδια επομένως θέση έχει το Πνεύμα με τον Πατέρα και τον Υιό, την ίδια ουσία, την ίδια εξουσία, την ίδια δόξα. Και εκ μέρους μας την ίδια προσκύνηση και λατρεία. Και το διακηρύττουμε κατά θεία Λειτουρνία: τn «Προσκυνούμεν Πατέρα, Υιόν και Άγιον Πνεύμα· Τριάδα ομοούσιον και αχώριστον». Την τρίτη θέση στη Θεότητα κατέχει το Πνεύμα το Άγιο, αλλά στην ίδια γραμμή με τα άλλα θεία πρόσωπα. Πρώτος ο Πατήρ ως αρχή της θεότητας και αρχή πάντων των δημιουργημάτων. Δεύτερος ο Υιός, διότι εκείνος είναι «η δημιουργική και συνεκτική των απάντων Θεού σοφία και δύναμις». Τρίτο το Άγιο Πνεύμα, το οποίο τελειοί, δηλαδή τελειοποιεί και αγιάζει τα πάντα. Και όπως το λέει ο μεγάλος Πατέρας της Εκκλησίας, ο άγιος Βασίλειος· «Αρχή γαρ των όντων μία, δι' Υιού δημιουργούσα και τελειούσα εν Πνεύματι».

Ρητώς και σαφώς ονομάζεται Θεός το Πνεύμα το Άγιο στην Αγία Γραφή μία φορά, στην περίπτωση που ψεύσθηκε στον Πέτρο ο Ανανίας ως προς την τιμή στην οποία πούλησε με τη σύζυγό του το κτήμα τους. Τότε ελέγχοντας το εκούσιο αμάρτημα του Ανανία ο Απόστολος του είπε· «Ανανία, διατί επλήρωσεν ο σατανάς την καρδίαν σου, ψεύσασθαί σε το Πνεύμα το Άγιον... ουκ εψεύσω ανθρώποις, αλλά τω Θεώ» (Πραξ. ε΄ 3,4). Αλλά και από όσα λέγονται ως προς τις ιδιότητες και ενέργειες του Αγίου Πνεύματος, σαφώς διαφαίνεται ότι η θεία Γραφή διδάσκει, ότι το Πνεύμα

είναι Θεός. Στην Παλαιά Διαθήκη αναφέρεται, ότι κατά τη δημιουργία και πριν αρχίσει η διαμόρφωση του κόσμου «Πνεύμα Θεού επεφέρετο επάνω του ύδατος», για να μορφοποιήσει και τελειοποιήσει την δημιουργία. Δηλαδή αποδίδει θεία ιδιότητα και εξουσία στο Πνεύμα. Στην Καινή Διαθήκη ο απόστολος Παύλος λέει, ότι «το Πνεύμα πάντα ερευνά και τα βάθη του Θεού». Άρα Θεός πρέπει να είναι για να ερευνά τα βάθη του Θεού, τα οποία κανένα κτίσμα, καμία ύπαρξη εκτός της Θεότητας, ούτε Άγγελος ούτε άνθρωπος μπορεί να ερευνήσει. Για να λέει ότι «ερευνά τα βάθη του Θεού», υπονοεί ότι αυτό, το Πνεύμα δηλαδή, είναι «ομοούσιον και ίσον τω Θεώ και Πατρί και ακριβώς οίδε (γνωρίζει) τα τε άλλα πάντα και αυτά τα κρύφια του Θεού», όπως λένε οι θεοφόροι Πατέρες. Διότι «μόνοι (ο Πατήρ, ο Υιός και το Άγιο Πνεύμα) των πάντων ίσην έχουσι την περί αλλήλων γνώσιν» και επομένως «ίσοι εισίν». Ίσος ο Υιός προς τον Πατέρα. Ίσο και το Άγιο Πνεύμα προς τον Υιό και τον Πατέρα. Έπειτα ο ίδιος Απόστολος ονομάζει Κύριο το Πνεύμα-«ο δε Κύριος το Πνεύμα εστιν· ού δε το Πνεύμα Κυρίου, εκεί ελευθερία» (Β΄ Κορινθ. γ΄ 17). Το Πνεύμα ονομάζεται «Πνεύμα Σοφίας», «Πνεύμα συνέσεως», «Πνεύμα αγιασμού», Πνεύμα που έχει «χαρίσματα» και τα διανέμει κατά βούληση. Πνεύμα που λαλεί διά των προφητών, «το λαλήσαν διά των προφητών», όπως λέμε στο Σύμβολο και όπως και ο απόστολος Πέτρος λέει, ότι «υπό Πνεύματος Αγίου φερόμενοι ελάλησαν άγιοι Θεού άνθρωποι». Και για να μη μακρύνουμε, αναφέρουμε τελευταία την ευλογία που δίνει ο θείος Παύλος στους Κορινθίους και θέτει το Πνεύμα στην ίδια σειρά με τον Πατέρα και τον Υιό ως πρόσωπο της Θεότητας. «Η χάρις του Κυρίου Ιησού Χριστού, λέει, και η αγάπη του Θεού και η κοινωνία του Αγίου Πνεύματος μετά πάντων υμών» (Β' Κορινθ. ιγ' 13).

Το Πνεύμα είναι ο Παράκλητος, τον οποίο υποσχέθηκε ο Κύριος να αποστείλει στους Μαθητές του μετά την ανάληψή του, για να μη αφήσει αυτούς ορφανούς «εγώ ερωτήσω τον Πατέρα και άλλον Παράκλητον δώσει υμίν, ίνα μένη μεθ΄ υμών εις τον αιώνα, το Πνεύμα της αληθείας» (Ιωάν. ιδ΄ 16). Και πάλι· «όταν έλθη ο παράκλητος όν εγώ πέμψω υμίν παρά του

Πατρός, το Πνεύμα της αληθείας... οδηγήσει υμάς εις πάσαν την αλήθειαν» (ιωάν. ιε' 26, ιστ' 13). Και τους οδήγησε σε όλη την αλήθεια, όταν την ημέρα της Πεντηκοστής κατήλθε στους αγίους μαθητές και αποστόλους του Κυρίου με μορφή πύρινων γλωσσών και τους ανέδειξε πάνσοφους διδασκάλους της οικουμένης. Αυτό το Πνεύμα οδηγεί και εμάς στην αλήθεια, μας παρηγορεί, μας ειρηνεύει, μας οδηγεί στην προσευχή· «το γαρ τι προσευξόμεθα καθό δει ουκ οίδαμεν, αλλ' αυτό το Πνεύμα υπερεντυγχάνει υπέρ ημών στεναγμοίς αλαλήτοις», και «αυτό το Πνεύμα συμμαρτυρεί τω πνεύματι ημών ότι εσμέν τέκνα Θεού» (Ρωμ. η' 16, 26).

Το Πνεύμα το Άγιο συγκρότησε την Εκκλησία του Χριστού. Διότι ναι μεν την Εκκλησία την ίδρυσε ο Κύριος, όταν εξέλεξε του ς δώδεκα πρώτους μαθητές του. Αλλ' αυτό ήταν ο πυρήνας της Εκκλησίας. Η Εκκλησία ως θείο καθίδρυμα σωτηρίας συνεστήθη υπό του Αγίου Πνεύματος κατά την ημέρα της Πεντηκοστής, διότι «πάντα συνεργεί το Πνεύμα το Άγιον, βρύει προφητείας, ιερέας τελειοί, αγραμμάτους σοφίαν εδίδαξεν, αλιείς θεολόγους ανέδειξεν, όλον συγκροτεί τον θεσμόν της Εκκλησίας». Και μένει στην Εκκλησία και την καθοδηγεί σε όλη την αλήθεια, τελεσιουργεί και αγιάζει τα θεία μυστήρια και μέσω αυτών αγιάζει τους πιστούς, καθοδηγεί στην ορθή πίστη για των αγίων Οικουμενικών Συνόδων, κατευθύνει τον κάθε ένα από εμάς στην οδό της σωτηρίας.

Το Πνεύμα το Άγιο δεν γεννάται από τον Πατέρα, όπως ο Υιός, αλλ' εκπορεύεται από τον Πατέρα και πέμπεται διά του Υιού. Ο ίδιος ο Κύριος το είπε· «Όταν έλθη ο Παράκλητος όν εγώ πέμψω υμίν παρά του Πατρός το Πνεύμα της αληθείας ό παρά του Πατρός εκπορεύεται» (Ιωάν. ιε' 26). Παρά του Πατρός, λοιπόν, εκπορεύεται το Πνεύμα και όχι «και εκ του Υιού», όπως αιρετικά και πλανημένα δογμάτισαν οι κακόδοξοι Παπικοί και νόθευσαν και την ορθή διδασκαλία της αγίας Εκκλησίας περί Αγίου Πνεύματος (1). Μη θεωρούμε μικρή και ασήμαντη την αίρεση αυτή των Παπικών. Είναι μεγάλη και φοβερή, αφού αντίκειται σαφώς προς αυτόν το λόγο του Κυρίου.

THE DIVINE LITURGY REVISITED by Herb Schuster

It's not uncommon to find the Divine Liturgy under attack these days. Some complain that it ought to be shorter while others argue over the preferred language. Many young women question a perceived exclusivism and wonder why they can't be in the Alter. Is the Divine Liturgy stuck in a past so that many of our needs today seem neglected? What these complaints suggest is a loss of meaning to the Divine Liturgy. Do we

understand what the Divine Liturgy is? Has it become a "service"? Perhaps we ought to revisit the Divine Liturgy and see what we've been missing.

Let's face it - most of us "go to Church". We "attend" the Divine Liturgy. Worse, we "go to" Communion. What's wrong with these actions? You will notice that the Divine Liturgy occurs as an event, with or without your presence. If you choose to be present, it occurs while you "attend". Think of a concert or a sporting event. Other people are doing various things for you and that you would like to enjoy. But sometimes, these events let you down. The show wasn't really worth the effort and the home team really played poorly. You leave with a sense of loss, both in terms of money paid for the event and time wasted watching something un-stimulating. But maybe the next game, the next concert, will get it just where you need it to be. And so you return, hoping for more.

If that's your approach to the Divine Liturgy, then you have to know why you are even "going". You have to have a sense of this "something more" that you come for. Otherwise, what is it about the Divine Liturgy that made you make the effort "to go"? Maybe what's wrong with the Divine Liturgy is really about what's wrong with you! Why do you "go"? Unless this is understood, it really won't



matter to you if it's in a Martian language! So, let's look more closely at this amazing Divine Liturgy and what it really is. One thing it is not is a "service".

Derived from the Greek word "leitourgia" it means "work of the people" and is often translated as "public service" from which it has been shorten to a "religious service". It wasn't long before the public did less

and less work and started "attending" rather than participating. The early Church never had seats because everything always occurred within the whole gathering, the public, the people. We have a Little Entrance and a Great Entrance that are the bringing into the public the Words of Christ and the wine and bread that become His Body and Blood. Why is that? Because we have been called into His coming when the Divine Liturgy begins. Many people seem to have lost this sense of location. While we are in a Church, we are far from being a building in Randolph. We have been invited into Christ's world. Unfortunately many think of themselves as dinner guests. Hopefully there'll be good coffee!

The Divine Liturgy may be presented in any number of languages, but that does not locate any Divine Liturgy into any nationalism. Sadly, when the history of a nation is intimately bound with their religion it often provides a platform that prioritizes cultural identity over the health of one's soul. The Greek word, Xenia, which has always been a concept of hospitality, generosity, and courtesy shown to the "stranger", is now used in judgement.

Each person who enters the Kingdom, the Church, is invited to participate. Every pew has a copy of the Divine Liturgy written in both Greek and English. When you begin to participate, you will

notice that the people are asked for their response, that the people are reading and chanting the Liturgy. There are prayers that the priest says which you are invited to quietly say by reading. When you read the words, you hear the words percolate slowly into your heart. What is this or that prayer for? What is the moment of kneeling about and why isn't it done for 40 days after Pascha? Do you know who the Holy Spirit is and what the role is of the Holy Spirit within the Divine Liturgy? We are Trinitarian, but exactly what does that mean to you? Am I actually "worshipping" or just repeating things without being mindful of content? Do I even know what "worship" really is? You can't worship someone that you don't know. Is God just "up there"? How do you know God anyway? Is God just some form of our sense of perfection?

Many people attend the service and quietly endure its length. Why are you there? If the Divine Liturgy is always a call into Christ's presence to which each of us is called for the healing our suffering souls, why then do so many not "receive" this gift of the Eucharistic purpose of all Liturgies? The answer is always "I'm not prepared". If you aren't "prepared", then why did you attend the Divine Liturgy that is far too long and filled with too much Greek? And this is really the crisis that exists within the Church. You aren't prepared because you fail to recognize how ill your soul has become. Sin is not all the little bad things we do. Sin is never an ethical issue where you have to apologize for breaking a rule or two. This sort of legalism operates in many religions today. That is not what Orthodoxy teaches. Sin is about who we are, and our sins arise from how we act out of who we are. If we are ill by Sin, we will manifest those signs of our illness that call us to attend them. Failure to do so may bring on a far worsening condition. Sin's ultimate end is always death of the soul. This is not some guiet finality; rather, souls apart from God suffer the loss of God and this is the dreaded eternal death of Hell! Unless we take seriously our soul's condition, then the Divine Liturgy will fail in

it's purpose. What is that purpose? To be transformed from the human image into the likeliness of Christ. Here is life, eternal life! The Divine Liturgy is the "work" that we do in order to undergo a transformation into life not by "imitating" Christ, but by being transformed into Christ. A soul that comes to the Divine Liturgy and does not receive the Eucharist because it is "unprepared" will never have the opportunity for recovery from Sin. It is absolutely imperative that you do come prepared to "receive", not "take", the Eucharistic gift for your renewal. If a doctor insisted you take a medicine at a particular time in order to get better, would you ignore it?

"Eastern Christians witness the exaltation and sanctification of creation, the majestic appearance of God who enters them, sanctifies them, divinizes them through the transfiguring light of God's heavenly grace. It is not only a matter of "receiving the sacraments," but of living habitually within a liturgical ambience that encompasses one in body and soul, transfiguring one's faith into a concrete vision of spiritual beauty and joy." (Beyond East and West, Robert F. Taft, 1997, p156-157)

What is the Divine Liturgy? It is our, the people's, common prayer that brings each of us into the mystery of Christ and "JOY"! Here "mystery" is not something you don't know - it is that kind of knowledge that enters each of us wordlessly and reveals to us what we can never imagine for ourselves. And if the Divine Liturgy is a prayer that you, like incense, offer up to God, then it will never happen if you remain a spectator attending the event of the Divine Liturgy without an attitude of genuine prayer. That "something more" demands your presence as a participant. God is relational and is worshipped in the relationship of love.

If you find yourself filled with questions about the Liturgy, speak with Fr. John. Your priest is there for you. But before you decide to seek changing the Divine Liturgy to accommodate the world, first explore the Divine Liturgy and discover how it accommodates you to Heaven, to Christ's eternal

Kingdom and make the Divine Liturgy your personal work of prayer. This means coming "prepared" to receive the gifts and this means the Body and Blood of Christ so essential for your renewal. Coming, attending, and enduring the Divine Liturgy is a waste of time! You might as well never take the prescription the doctor has prescribed for your wellness. It may be harsh, even

bold, but if you "attend" the Divine Liturgy without participating in it and receiving the divine gifts, then you really have never been in the Divine Liturgy. Give yourself over to it and work along with it, always remaining in prayer, ready to come before Christ, who is present at every Liturgy! And discover the Joy for which you came in the first place!

ESTATE PLANNING FOR YOU AND YOUR FAMILY.

An estate plan is not just for high-net-worth individuals, it's for everyone who is single, has a spouse, has a partner, has dependents, owns a business, has investments, has retirement funds, owns property, or has material possessions of value such as a car. You should update your estate plan whenever a major change occurs in your life, such as purchasing a home, moving in with a significant other, getting married, having or adopting a baby, selling your business, getting a divorce, retiring, or having a beneficiary die before you do. Review your plan when federal and state laws on estate taxes change.

If you should die without a will (which is called "intestate"),³ the state and federal governments will have standard procedures for distributing your assets, and they may not be in line with your wishes. Your beneficiaries may have to pay more in estate taxes, and probate may take considerably longer than it would if you had a will in place.

Consult a professional financial advisor on tax and estate planning. Trusts can be complicated to set up, so consult a professional trusts and estates attorney or certified public account before you begin

PARENTS' CORNER by Alexandra Protopapas

June - 2019 - Summer & Childhood Obesity - Have you noticed changes in your children?

Wow! June is here, schools will be out, and our children hopefully will be out more exercising, but also eating more as well. I've had a good year, with some medical issues, but overcame them and still trying to work on maintaining a healthy lifestyle throughout the summer. In my current part-time work, I have also been working with a child who is obese and has developed medical issues because of her obesity. A recall a recent article I wrote with relevant information from the *American Heart Association* and decided to update it and post it for our parishioners as awareness for this summer.

Now there is a subject we need to think about as we prepare our children for the summer break! With the summer upon us, soccer, track, bicycling, camp, etc., we ought to think about preventing our children from becoming overweight or obese by involving them in the many outdoor activities available, but also encourage healthy eating habits. All that delicious Greek food is great and tasty, certainly better than fast food, but are we encouraging our children to overeat?

We think about out children not getting involved with drugs and alcohol, but did we ever stop and think that their weight is also something we should consider? We need to help out children identify healthier food choices which will help them make healthier decisions for long term health. Our Greek culture with our many healthy ethnic dishes (mmm—that Cretan Olive Oil) has an impact on choosing good preferences. It is not always easy for our children to resist snacks and sodas and fast food as it is all around them.

Here are some facts from experts at the *American Heart Association*:

"Childhood Obesity – A Serious Problem

Today about 25 million kids (ages 2-19) in the United States are overweight or at risk of becoming overweight. That's nearly one of every three kids. Overweight kids

are more likely to become overweight adults.

Some experts believe that if obesity among kids continues to increase at this rate, our current generation could become the FIRST in American history to live shorter lives than their parents.

Reasons for the Crisis

At many schools kids can have soda, candy and fast food for lunch. They also have fewer opportunities to exercise and play. At home, kids are spending more inactive time in front of a TV, play station or computer. When kids eat out they are surrounded by foods and drink that taste good, but are often unhealthy. Portion sizes are also continuing to increase. Fast food is no longer a treat but a regular meal for many kids. The result is an increase in serious health problems earlier in life. High cholesterol, high blood pressure, stroke, type 2 diabetes and depression are now a part of more and more kids' lives."

Making Better Choices at Fast Food Restaurants

There are times when most of us are going to eat fast food because it's quick and easy, (especially when the kids are home from school in the summer!) That's why, when you do eat fast food, it's so important to make the best choices you can. Here are some tips you can use when your kids order. These small changes will help cut down on calories, fat, salt and sugar:

- Go light on the sauce: There are lots of hidden calories in mayo, sour cream, salad dressing and other sauces. Go easy or nix them all together.
- Choose the chicken: When in doubt, order a grilled, baked or broiled chicken—not fried or breaded.
- **Veg out on the sandwich**: Ask for tomato, lettuce, onion, or other veggies on your sandwich.
- **Swap out the fries and onion rings**: Order a side salad or baked potato. Large fries can be at least 500 calories a serving!
- **Pass on the soda:** Opt for water, juice, or fat-free and low-fat milk instead of high-fat shakes and sugary soda.
- Opt for regular sizes: It may seem like a good "value" but there are lots of extra calories and fats in those extra-large. Go for the regular size.
- Go for whole-wheat: Whole-wheat buns should have more fiber than regular white bread. Some restaurants offer wheat buns as an alternative—all you have to do is ask.
- **Thin crust it:** Go for a thin-crust pizza with veggies instead of a thick-crust with meats and extra cheese.
- **Treat yourself**: Go for low fat frozen yogurt, (the Greek yogurt is delicious) fruit popsicles, sorbets, and sherbets rather than ice cream or cookies. Sprinkles are also better than caramel or chocolate sauces.

- Skip the sides: Eating a burger or sandwich by itself is often filling enough. If you do want a side, consider ordering a fruit cup or side salad. Most fast food restaurants now offer them.
- Avoid double meat and bacon: A serving size of meat is 2-3 ounces about the size of a deck of cards. You're probably getting well over that with a single meat patty. Bacon is also high in calories and fat."

What to do at home with those picky eaters? They love junk food!

It is really common for kids to be picky about what they eat and to turn their nose up at healthy foods. I chose these top 10 tips would help even the pickiest eater enjoy healthy mealtimes.

- 1. **Get them excited about healthy food**: Let them smell, touch, taste, ask questions and try fruits, veggies, yogurts and other healthy foods in the kitchen. Ask them what they think of the foods and let them know their opinions count.
- 2. **Get them involved in the kitchen**: Let them help you with small, kid-safe jobs in the kitchen such as mixing ingredients. Be sure to thank them for their help.
- 3. Give them a say in what they eat: Help your kids make the right food and drink choices from an early age. If they have a say in decisions they will be more excited about what they eat. It's a great way to get them to take charge of their health.
- 4. Take them grocery shopping with you: Get your kids involved in shopping decisions. It may take a little more time in the supermarket but it is likely to lead to fewer tantrums at meals.
- 5. **Keep the junk food out of the house**; your kids can't eat unhealthy snacks if you don't buy them. Kids will moan at first but soon they will get hungry and reach for the apple instead of the chips.
- 6. Add healthy food when you can: Find ways to add healthy foods into foods your child already likes. You can put blueberries in pancakes, chopped fruit on cereal, or small pieces of broccoli in macaroni and cheese.
- 7. **Help them learn**: Encourage your kids to draw or doodle pictures of healthy foods or write a poem. Post on the fridge and make sure they know you are proud.
- 8. **Sit together:** Try to set aside your meals as family time. Turn off the TV and enjoy eating together.

- 9. **Keep healthy snacks on hand**: Bring healthy snacks when you pick them up from camp, GOYA, after sports practice, and at other times when you know their stomachs will be grumbling.
- 10. Make healthy food and meals fun: Try cutting up food into fun shapes or making faces out of fruit and vegetables. Putting healthy snacks such as oatmeal cookies or dried fruit into a fun bag can turn healthy foods into a cool snack for your child."

Make those Greek Koulourakia with Rachel Ray's low fat recipes. Let's eat, of course, but let's make better choices together!

I will be visiting family out of state and then unto Greece this summer so eating out will be something I will be doing a lot and enjoying the Greek sun in Karpathos, Rhodes, and Crete! Whatever I do, I will try to fit in some exercise outdoors with swimming, walking, and less eating!



The Feast of Holy Pentecost is celebrated each year on the fiftieth day after the Great and Holy Feast of Pascha (Easter) and ten days after the Feast of the Ascension of Christ. The Feast is always celebrated on a Sunday. The Feast commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles on the day of Pentecost, a feast of the Jewish tradition. It also celebrates the establishment of the Church through the preaching of the Apostles and the baptism of the thousands who on that day believed in the Gospel message of salvation through Jesus Christ. The Feast is also seen as the culmination of the revelation of the Holy Trinity.
