ORTHODOX CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

Dear St. Andrew Parishioner,

A traditional American proverb says that, "God makes this request of his children: Do the best you can, where you are, with what you have, now." The story of Jesus Christ feeding the 5,000 illustrates this through the boy's offering of all that he had – five loaves and two fish. This boy did his best with what he had, and Jesus used it to perform an incredible miracle. Just like the boy who offered the loaves and the fish, if we offer what we have – however great or small our gift – God will receive our gifts and multiply them to feed His people.

This past year, God has multiplied the offerings of our members, and with His help we have continued the growth of our ministry programs. The many Liturgical services and meetings that take place at Saint Andrew are only the tip of the iceberg of what goes on here. We held a very successful fundraiser for the (International Orthodox Charities), we have the ongoing Pillow and Blanket ministries which meet at church weekly. Our youth programs are amongst the strongest of the Greek Orthodox parishes in the Northern New Jersey area and these include the JOY, GOYA, Sunday School, and OCF. We have worked on and shortly will be receiving our own 501c3 from the IRS. This will enable us to receive matching grants and qualify us to raise money without overtaxing and burdening our parishioners. We are pleased to say that our Hellenic Afternoon School has grown from last year to this and our PTA has planned many activities that so many enjoy and benefit from. I will also mention that the philanthropic work of the Philoptochos continues to grow and touch so many lives that are in need. We are very excited about all of the good work and beautiful progress our parish has made and there is still so much more work to be done, but only with your help. Your support of the various ministries of Saint Andrew is essential to continuing the growth of good work that takes place here.

So, I invite you to be with us here at Saint Andrew Church for these special Sundays beginning on October 29th and concluding on November 19th. Over these few weeks we will worship together as we do each Sunday. In addition, we will learn more about our parish, our leadership and our ministries.

During this time, we encourage you to visit/meet with all of our parish/ministry leaders to learn more about the current vision of our community and see how you can more fully participate in realizing this vision. St. Paul says, we are to give, "...as God has prospered us" (I Cor. 16:2). He teaches us clearly, "He who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully." I offer my sincere thanks to God for His Love and kindness as He has blessed our church and to you for your dedication to our parish of Saint Andrew and your participation in Christ's work of salvation

Frequently Asked Questions:

How do I become a member of the parish?

Membership in the Orthodox Church begins at baptism (Chrismation for some) and continues throughout our life. We are united with Christ through the sacraments, or mysteries, of the Church and through our faithful offering of our entire selves to Jesus Christ.





Our Archdiocese requires each parish to distinguish between voting members and non-voting members. A voting member is over 18 years of age and turns in a signed stewardship commitment card, committing a portion of time, talent and treasure to the Church. The Archdiocese also requires the voting member to remain current through the year on their commitments. Keep in mind that true membership in the Body of Christ involves living according to His word and within His Church.

Why must I commit to give a specific amount?

Please keep in mind that your stewardship of money is kept in the strictest of confidence. However, we do compile the amounts anticipated to better plan our budget.

What if I cannot fulfill my stewardship commitment?

During the course of a year, people's circumstances change. Your offering is valued because it is made out of your love for God and His Church. Please do not be concerned if you are unable to meet your stewardship pledge – we are glad you are a part of this parish.

- ...learning how to be a responsible and concerned caretaker of Christ's Church; it is learning how to enjoy Church life and be happy in Church work, for in Her dwells the fullness of the Spirit of God.

ΠΟΥ ΠΡΟΣΑΝΑΤΟΛΙΖΕΣΤΕ;

Του Πατέρα Ιωάννη Θεοδοσίου

Ο προσανατολισμός είναι σε όλα σημαντικός. Τις προάλλες οδηγούσα μπροστά από ένα σπίτι στο οποίο πρόσφατα είχαν τοποθετηθεί συλλέκτες ηλιακής ενέργειας. Αναρωτήθηκα «Γιατί οι συλλέκτες βρίσκονται στο μπροστινό μέρος του σπιτιού αντί για το πίσω; Στο πίσω μέρος του σπιτιού δεν θα φαίνονταν ούτε θα χαλούσαν την εμφάνιση του σπιτιού». Τότε, ξαφνικά σκέφτηκα ότι ο προσανατολισμός των ηλιακών συλλεκτών ήταν πολύ σημαντικός. Οι ηλιακοί συλλέκτες πρέπει να είναι στραμμένοι προς τον ήλιο για να έχουν τη μέγιστη απόδοση. Επειδή είναι «ηλιακοί», αυτό σημαίνει ότι αν τοποθετηθούν με την πρόσοψη να μην κοιτάει προς τον ήλιο, δεν θα μπορούν να παράγουν αρκετό ηλεκτρικό ρεύμα και έτσι μειώνεται η απόδοσή τους.

Αυτό μου φέρνει μία σκέψη που κάνω για εμάς τους Χριστιανούς. Αν έχετε πάει ποτέ σε βάπτιση στην Ορθόδοξη Εκκλησία, πιθανόν να θυμάστε ότι ο ιερέας σε κάποιο σημείο της λειτουργίας, βάζει το νονό ή τη νονά και το μωρό να γυρίσουν με την πλάτη τους προς το ιερό. Σε αυτό το σημείο, εκ μέρους του μωρού, ζητά από τον ανάδοχο, να αποταχθεί τον σατανά. Ο ιερέας το κάνει αυτό γιατί έτσι ο ανάδοχος και το παιδί γυρίζουν την πλάτη και απορρίπτουν τον Σατανά και τη διδασκαλία του και οποιαδήποτε μορφή κακού. Мε άλλα λόγια, είναι απόρριψη αποπροσανατολισμού του διαβόλου. Έπειτα, στρέφονται προς το Ιερό και προς τον Χριστό και δέχονται τη διδασκαλία του Χριστού και της Εκκλησίας που συνοψίζονται στο Σύμβολο της Πίστεως. Το παιδί την ημέρα της βάπτισής του κατευθύνεται / προσανατολίζεται προς τον Χριστό

και προς την Εκκλησία Του και τοποθετείται στο δρόμο προς τη σωτηρία.

Καθώς το παιδί μεγαλώνει και ωριμάζει, οι γονείς και οι νονοί πρέπει να εξασφαλίσουν ότι το παιδί καθώς θα περιπλανάται, θα επαναφέρεται και θα επαναπροσανατολίζεται στο δρόμο του Θεού και της Εκκλησίας Του, στο δρόμο προς την σωτηρία. Το βλέπουμε συνεχώς καθώς είμαστε μάρτυρες ζωών που έχουν χάσει και ξαναβρεί τον προσανατολισμό τους. Καμία φορά η επαναφορά είναι συνειδητή απόφαση και μερικές φορές είναι ασυναίσθητη. όλα Παρ' αυτά συμβαίνει. Βρίσκουμε διάφορους λόγους γιατί η πίστη μας στον Θεό και η ενασχόλησή μας με την Εκκλησία πρέπει να έχουν δεύτερη θέση σε οτιδήποτε συμβαίνει στη ζωή μας. Κάποιοι θα πουν «Κυριακή είναι η μέρα που κοιμάμαι ως αργά». Κάποιοι θα πουν «Ο προπονητής δεν μας αφήνει να λείψουμε από την προπόνηση». Άλλοι, «Πρέπει να πάω στη δουλειά». Κάποιοι είναι απελπισμένοι και εκτός ελέγχου καθώς πολεμούν ένα είδος εξάρτησης. Καταλαβαίνετε, καθώς και εσείς πιθανόν έχετε δει ή ξανακούσει ή ακόμη τα έχετε και εσείς πει αυτά. συμβαίνει Έτσι αυτό που είναι να αποπροσανατολιζόμαστε είτε εν γνώσει είτε άθελά μας. Νομίζω στις περισσότερες περιπτώσεις οι πιστεύουν άνθρωποι ότι έχουν σωστό προσανατολισμό επειδή ισχυρίζονται ότι είναι «ενεργά μέλη» της εκκλησίας ακόμη και αν έχουν μικρή ενασχόληση εκεί. Πρέπει να σας πω ότι βάζοντας το όνομά σας στον κατάλογο της εκκλησίας, ο εκκλησιασμός μόνο την Μεγάλη Εβδομάδα και η εθελοντική προσφορά στο φεστιβάλ μας, δεν είναι αυτά που κάνουν κάποιον

«ενεργό μέλος της εκκλησίας» ή που τον βάζουν στον ορθό δρόμο προς τη σωτηρία.

Αν προσπαθήσουμε να πάμε πίσω στο χρόνο που βαπτιστήκαμε, πιθανόν δεν θα θυμούμαστε εκείνη την ημέρα αφού πολλοί από εμάς βαπτιζόμαστε πριν από τα πρώτα μας γενέθλια. Τί συνέβη τότε; Οι νονοί μας και ο ιερεύς απέρριψαν τον Σατανά, δέχτηκαν τον Χριστό εκ μέρους μας, μας προσανατόλισαν προς τον Χριστό και μας έβαλαν στο δρόμο προς τη σωτηρία. Μας έφεραν στην εκκλησία τουλάχιστον τρεις Κυριακές στη σειρά για να μεταλάβουμε την Θεία Κοινωνία, κρέμασαν εικόνες στο δωμάτιό μας, μας έμαθαν προσευχές και μας διάβασαν ιστορίες της Βίβλου πριν μας βάλουν για ύπνο. Όλα αυτά είναι καλά πράγματα που μας βοηθούν να έχουμε τον σωστό προσανατολισμό προς το Θεό και την Εκκλησία Του. Άραγε τί συμβαίνει μετά από αυτά;

Μερικές ερωτήσεις που πρέπει να κάνουμε στον εαυτό μας είναι, «Τί μας συνέβη από τότε;" αισθανόμαστε σαν να έχουμε μειωμένη αποτελεσματικότητα «στην πνευματική μας ζωή;" "Εστιάζουμε τη ζωή μας στη σωτηρία μας, ή το αναβάλλουμε;» «Συνέβη κάτι που άλλαξε τον προσανατολισμό μας; «Αν έχουμε χάσει την κατεύθυνσή μας προς το Θεό και την Εκκλησία Του ή ακόμη αν έχει τελείως αποπροσανατολιστεί η

ζωή μας, τί μπορούμε να κάνουμε να το διορθώσουμε;

Για την απάντηση, νομίζω πρέπει να γυρίσουμε στην εικόνα των ηλιακών συσσωρευτών. Μόλις τοποθετηθούν, δεν αλλάζουν. Μένουν προσηλωμένα στην πιο κατάλληλη θέση για να παίρνουν τις ακτίνες του ήλιου. Το μάθημά μας εδώ είναι ξεκάθαρο. Αν έχουμε απομακρυνθεί από τον Θεό και έχουμε αλλάξει πορεία ή χάσει τον προσανατολισμό μας στη ζωή, τότε πρέπει να γυρίσουμε πίσω. Ξέρω ότι αυτό είναι μία και πιθανόν να θέλατε μεταφορά πιο συγκεκριμένες ιδέες, αλλά το καλύτερο που θα σας πω να κάνετε, είναι να μιλήσετε με τον ιερέα σας ή με άλλον ιερέα με τον οποίο αισθάνεστε άνετα. Θα μπορέσει να σας οδηγήσει με ένα στέρεο πνευματικό σχέδιο να έχει η ζωή σας τον προσανατολισμό που πρέπει.

Τελικά, αυτή η ζωή είναι μία προσωρινή διαμονή έως ότου φύγουμε από εδώ για την αιωνιότητα με τον ουράνιο Πατέρα μας, τον Υιό Του, και το Άγιο Πνεύμα. Θα πρέπει να κάνουμε ότι καλύτερο μπορούμε με όσα μας έχει ευλογήσει ο Θεός να έχουμε σε αυτή τη ζωή. Να μην ξεχνούμε πού πηγαίνουμε. Ο προσανατολισμός μας πρέπει να είναι προς τον Θεό και τη Σωτηρία μας.

"Whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him." (Colossians 3:17)



"Continue earnestly in prayer, being vigilant in it with thanksgiving." (Colossians 4:2)

"Why should we care for anyone else but ourselves? Doesn't the world send us this message? But you see, when all that matters, there's no need to say "thank you" because no one else matters. Such a deep self-centeredness is alien to Orthodoxy. Here we find a God, the very Creator of the universe, taking the time to notice that we need help even when we are completely convinced that "I can do it myself!" Truth is, most of us need quite a bit of help!

There are so many people who just ended up needing help, lots of help. Jesus asks us quite boldly to avoid judging. We always seem to want to have reasons to help us decide whether we should help. That's a bad way to help. And that's not how Philoptochos helps. Philoptochos helps because someone, anyone, is calling out. That's it! "How can I help?"

Thanksgiving connects us to an event in which a need was met. It's always easy to help friends, people you might like, but it's also easy to avoid helping others who might not be friends, who might not meet our standards. There's another side to helping - what if it were you in need rather than you having the chance to help? You might appreciate it if you didn't have to qualify for help. That's the point of the Good Samaritan, isn't it? How easy to pass by someone we can eliminate from our preferred list of those we help.

That's not Philoptochos!

Philoptochos invites each of us to be centered in its mission to meet the need of those in need. But as Paul reminds us, we all have different gifts, different roles, in God's kingdom. Getting to know what your gift is, is important, because it is from that place that you are called to respond. This is what God asks of each of us.

DO YOU HAVE A CHILD IN GRADES K-6? Yes?




Kassandra and Constantine were both awarded 3rd runner up! We are all very proud of their accomplishments and their dedication to our GOYA and faith!

Also, Venia Sedereas and Nicholas Theodosion we recognized as our 2017 GOYA scholaship winners!


St. Basil Walk-A-Thon

Stewardship Sunday - Nov. 19



Saint Phocas was a gardener and Saint Euphrosinos was a cook. They are not known as "Phocas the Great" or "Euphrosinos the Theologian." Known instead by the work they did, they became saints of the Church. We know that service to God and His Church is sacred, and because of this we strive to serve and support the Church. But is it possible for our work to be sacred? Can we Christian stewards $\circ f$ our work? According to Saint Porphyrios, "At your work, whatever it may be, you can become a saint through meekness, patience, and love."

In the second chapter of the Old Testament Book of Genesis we read, "The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it" (Genesis 2:15). God put man in the garden to work. It is part of God's plan for us that we work. In Exodus we read, "Six days you shall work, but on the seventh day you shall rest...." The world has changed. Very few of us are called to work the land and our work week may not be six days. Yet we are created and called by God to work, and we can serve him through our work.

Some are blessed to follow a career path to a life's work bringing satisfaction. Others may work in a position that may not appear to be spiritually or emotionally fulfilling. In whatever type of work we find ourselves, our work can become sacred when we dedicate it to God. In the words of Mother Theresa, "Wherever God has put you, that is your vocation. It is not what we do, but how much love we put into it."

Life on earth is a gift. The work we do is also a gift if we see it as an opportunity to serve God and others. Saint Paul instructs us, "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men...." (Colossians 3:23). When we see our work in this way, we are able to become Christian stewards of our work.

Stewardship of work teaches us that we don't own our work, our position, our title. We are only stewards of a position for a period of time. We are responsible to fulfill our duties and also to prepare it for the person that will follow us in that position. We may also have the opportunity to mentor the person that will assume our position when we move on, empowering them to apply their particular gifts and talents to take the position to the next level.

Christian stewardship of work also teaches us that we are responsible to those with whom we work and those that may be served by our work. We are called to reflect the light of Christ in their lives, encourage them, support them and even *love* them. We are also stewards of our co-workers inasmuch as we cooperate and support them in their efforts for the good of all.

Saint Phocas the Gardener lived in the late 3rd Century, in the ancient region of Paphlagonia (now northern Turkey). Phocas lived humbly on the sale of fruits and vegetables he would grow in his garden. Through his work, Phocas fed the hungry and gave shelter to those in need. Because of his dedication to his work and his generosity to those in need, he became a Christian example to others. Even the non-believers treated him with respect, and by his Christlike manner, many were drawn to the Christian Faith.

For further reflection...

Jesus said, "Well done good and faithful servant."

He did not say, "Well said."

He did not say, "Well planned."

He did not say, "Well thought."

And He did not say, "Well intended."

But He said, "Well *DONE*, good and faithful servant."

The emphasis for us as Christians is in doing.

We are called to give the best we have and to do the best we can to promote God's Kingdom on earth.

Και κάθε τι το οποίον πράττετε να το εργάζεσθε πρόθυμα με όλην σας την ψυχήν, σαν αυτό να αναφέρεται στον Κύριον και όχι στους ανθρώπους. (Προς Κολοσσαείς, Επιστολή Παύλου 3:23)

Ο Άγιος Φωκάς ήταν κηπουρός και ο Άγιος Ευφρόσυνος ήταν μάγειρας. Δεν είναι γνωστοί ως «ο Μέγας Φωκάς» ή «ο Ευφρόσυνος ο Θεολόγος». Αντίθετα είναι γνωστοί από την εργασία τους και έγιναν άγιοι της Εκκλησίας. Γνωρίζουμε ότι η υπηρεσία στον Θεό και την Εκκλησία Του είναι ιερή, και για το λόγο αυτό προσπαθούμε να υπηρετούμε και να υποστηρίζουμε την Εκκλησία. Αλλά είναι δυνατόν η εργασία μας να είναι ιερή; Μπορούμε να είμαστε Χριστιανοί επίτροποι της εργασίας μας; Σύμφωνα με τον Άγιο Πορφύριο, «Στην εργασία σας, οποιαδήποτε και να είναι, μπορείτε να γίνετε άγιοι με την πραότητα, υπομονή, και αγάπη.»

Στο δεύτερο κεφάλαιο του Βιβλίου της Γένεσης της Παλαιάς Διαθήκης, διαβάζουμε «Ο Κύριος πήρε τον άνθρωπο και τον έβαλε στον Κήπο της Εδέμ να εργάζεται και να τον φροντίζει.» (Γένεσις 2:15). Ο Θεός έβαλε τον άνθρωπο στον Κήπο να δουλέψει.

Είναι μέρος του σχεδίου του Θεού εμείς να εργαζόμαστε. Στην Έξοδο διαβάζουμε, «Έξι μέρες θα δουλεύετε, αλλά την έβδομη θα αναπαύεστε....» Ο κόσμος έχει αλλάξει. Πολλοί λίγοι από εμάς καλούνται να δουλέψουν τη γη και η εβδομάδα εργασίας ίσως να μην αποτελείται από έξι ημέρες. Και όμως ο Θεός μας δημιούργησε και μας κάλεσε να εργαστούμε, και να τον υπηρετούμε μέσα από την εργασία.

Κάποιοι είναι ευλογημένοι επειδή έχουν χαράξει μία καριέρα στη ζωή τους που τους φέρνει και ικανοποίηση. Άλλοι ίσως εργάζονται σε μία θέση που μα μην φαίνεται να τους ολοκληρώνει πνευματικά και συναισθηματικά. Σε οποιαδήποτε εργασία βρεθούμε, μπορεί να γίνει ιερή όταν την αφιερώνουμε στο Θεό. Η Μητέρα Τερέζα λέει, «Όπου σας έχει βάλει ο Θεός, αυτό είναι το επάγγελμά σας. Δεν έχει σημασία τί κάνουμε, αλλά το πόση αγάπη βάζουμε σε αυτό.»

Η ζωή στη γη είναι ένα δώρο. Η εργασία που κάνουμε είναι επίσης ένα δώρο αν τη βλέπουμε σαν ευκαιρία να υπηρετήσουμε τον Θεό και τους άλλους. Ο Απόστολος Παύλος μας συμβουλεύει, «Κάθε τι το οποίον πράττετε να το εργάζεσθε πρόθυμα με όλην σας την ψυχήν, σαν αυτό να αναφέρεται στον Κύριον και όχι στους ανθρώπους....» (Προς Κολοσσαείς 3:23). Οταν βλέπουμε την εργασία μας με αυτό τον τρόπο, μπορούμε να γίνουμε Χριστιανοί οικονόμοι της εργασίας μας.

Η Διαχείρηση της εργασίας μας διδάσκει ότι δεν μας ανήκει η εργασία μας, η θέση μας, ο τίτλος μας. Είμαστε μόνο διαχειριστές μίας θέσης για μία χρονική περίοδο. Έχουμε την ευθύνη να ολοκληρώσουμε τα καθήκοντά μας και επίσης να την ετοιμάσουμε για το άτομο που θα μας ακολουθήσει στην ίδια θέση. Ίσως ακόμη να έχουμε την ευκαιρία να εκπαιδεύσουμε το άτομο που θα πάρει τη θέση μας όταν εμείς προχωρήσουμε, δίνοντάς τους τη δύναμη να εφαρμόσουν τα χαρίσματα και τα ταλέντα τους και να μεταφέρουν τη θέση τους στο επόμενο επίπεδο.

Η Χριστιανική διαχείρηση της εργασίας μας διδάσκει επίσης ότι είμαστε υπεύθυνοι για αυτούς με τους οποίους δουλεύουμε και για αυτούς που θα εξυπηρετηθούν από την εργασία μας. Καλούμαστε να αντανακλούμε το φως του Χριστού στις ζωές μας, να τους ενθαρρύνουμε, να τους υποστηρίζουμε κσι ακόμη να τους αγαπούμε. Είμαστε επίσης διαχειριστές των συναδέλφων μας και πρέπει να συνεργαζόμαστε και να τους υποστηρίζουμε στις προσπάθειές τους για το καλό όλων.

Ο Άγιος Φωκάς ο Κηπουρός έζησε στο τέλος του 3° αιώνα, στην αρχαία περιοχή της Παφλαγονίας (σημερινή βόρεια Τουρκία). Ο Φωκάς έζησε ταπεινά πουλώντας φρούτα και λαχανικά που καλλιεργούσε στον δικό του κήπο. Μέσα από τη δουλειά του, ο Φωκάς τάιζε τους πεινασμένους και έδινε καταφύγιο σε όσους χρειάζονταν. Εξαιτίας της αφοσίωσής του στη εργασία του κατ της γενναιοδωρίας του, έγινε υπόδειγμα Χριστιανού. Ακόμη και αυτοί που δεν πίστευαν, του συμπεριφέρονταν με σεβασμό, και πολλούς προσήλκυσε με τον τρόπο του που έμοιαζε του Χριστού.

Father Alexander Schmemann celebrated the divine liturgy for the last time on Thanksgiving Day. This was particularly appropriate since Father Alexander had devoted his whole life to teaching, writing and preaching about the Eucharist; for the word eucharist in Greek means thanksgiving. At the conclusion of the liturgy, Father Alexander took from his pocket a short written sermon, in the form of a prayer, which he proceeded to read. This was a strange occurrence since Father never wrote his liturgical homilies, but delivered them extemporaneously. These were his words, which proved to be the last ever spoken by him from the ambo in Church.

NAVAGATING THROUGH YOUR TEEN YEARS: MANAGING STRESS

Q: I've got so much going on: school, sports, work, friends, and that doesn't even count time with my family. How do I manage it all?

A: All of these things are great, but sometimes they're overwhelming, right? First, never be too busy to pray—often times it's the first thing we cut from our schedule. Prayer is time spent with God, and even when we're busy, it's the one thing we really need. Second, make a plan. This helps us get a handle on our long "to do" lists. Lastly, ask for help! People that try to go it alone are often the most stressed. God, your family, your priest and your friends are all sources of support you can and should turn to.

Q: I'm stressed because I put things off until the very last minute. Why do I keep doing that?

A: Many people make themselves a victim of procrastination. To relieve the stress, we turn to things that entertain us: music, TV, surfing the net—anything to keep us from thinking about something we'd rather not do. The problem is, our "break" isn't really restful because we're just avoiding the problem. Later on, we'll have to face up to whatever it is we're putting off, and with not as much time to do it. Sounds familiar—and stressful—I bet. Ask God for help and then face up to the fear of tackling the hard things first and you'll find yourself much less stressed.

GET THE FACTS

Stress is normal. The real definition of stress is the effect on us from any change in our environment. Since changes happen all the



time, stress is normal and unavoidable. We run into problems when we have too much stress or stress we don't deal with.

Stress can hurt....and kill. Many scientists think that the majority of all illnesses and accidents can trace their causes to stress. Excessive stress not only lowers our immunities, but makes it hard to concentrate and make good decisions.

Stress is treatable. There are many things we can do to combat the effects of stress on our health and better prepare us for future stresses. Being aware of the sources of our stress and reducing them are some of the best things we can do to stay happy and healthy.

KNOW THE SIGNS

Since stress is AWAYS around us—we're all stressed to different degrees. If we have more stress than we can handle, there are a variety of things that often happen. Any of these symptoms might be a sign that we're not dealing well with stress:

- Headaches: Having headaches regularly, especially tension headaches, is often linked to being overly stressed.
- Getting sick often: The more stressed out we are, the worse our body is at fighting off everyday illnesses.
- Problems sleeping: Stress can make it harder to fall asleep or stay asleep, or might make our time sleeping less restful.
- Anxiety: This is often defined as feeling fear but not knowing exactly what we're afraid of.
- Fuzzy Thinking: When we're stressed, our bodies respond with adrenaline, the "fight or flight" hormone that prepares us for combat or a quick getaway. While this is helpful in an emergency, when triggered by long term stress, it can make it hard to think through things or cause you to think less clearly.
- Feelings of Frustration: If you're faced with many demands at once, the result for many people is increased frustration and irritability

THE CHURCH SPEAKS

You may think that the Church only teaches us things about God, prayer, and purely spiritual things, but there's so much more! Actually, one of the things that sets Orthodox Christianity apart is our belief that we can begin to experience the blessings of God's kingdom—Heaven—in this life. We don't have to wait until we die! God not only wants us to live a good life, but a great life (John 10:10).

• Fr. Meletios Webber says that stress is basically our body's reaction to thoughts. When we experience thoughts as scary or threatening, we experience lots of stress. Try envisioning stressful thoughts as puppies: your thoughts might be annoying, jumping and yapping in your head all of

the time, but in the end, they are only harmless and easily ignored!

- In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus encouraged us not to be "anxious about tomorrow for tomorrow will be anxious for itself" (Matthew :). Too often, we try to tackle way too much. One of the best ways to combat stress is to limit how much we try to deal with at any one time.
- The passage, "Come to me all you that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" is an invitation that comes to us from Jesus Himself (Matthew 11:28). He offers to bear our burdens and gives us the real opportunity to break free from stress through Him. When we're in church, when we pray, when we just sit in silence in front of our icons—that is where we find the "still waters" He promises us (Psalm 23).

Room for Agape a voice for our seniors November 2017



We have two great feast days this month: one for our National Thanksgiving and then one for the patron of our Community Church, Saint Andrew: family soul and sacred soul around which our lives are built. Both involve food at some point. Right now I'm focusing on **Soul Food** as a way to first recognize our personal starvation/ salvation - and then nourish our souls back to health.



By chance I came across <u>Gems from the Sunday Gospels</u> <u>in the Orthodox Church</u> (vol 2) by Anthony M Coniaris (a wonderful Christmas gift!). I'd like to share some of what he wrote as my contribution to our celebratory suppers – a nourishing dish and some appetizers.

"What shall a man profit if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul; what can a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Mark 8:36) Jesus corroborates this when He tells His disciples not to fear those would kill the body, but those who kill one's soul (to break or torment one's spirit). The soul is the real *you*, the part of you that is spiritual and thus not subject to physical death; it is the *you* that hopes, aspires, prays, suffers, loves, is tempted, sins, repents, and can be saved.

'An unbeliever once argued with a minister that there could not possibly be such a thing as a soul. "After all," he said, "you can go to a medical laboratory and see for yourself that man is just so much lime, sugar, phosphorus, carbon and starch." The minister begged to discontinue the conversation, only to be met with a rebuke from the unbeliever. "That was just what I expected. When you cannot reply logically to an argument, you refuse to carry on the conversation."

"But," replied the minister, "I am a reasonable man, and as such I must decline to hold an argument with so many quarts of water, so much phosphorus, so much lime, and so much carbon. Take away from anyone the spiritual, the soul, and all you have left are a few chemicals worth little. But add to the physical part of man the soul, and man is worth more than the entire universe! (pg 13-14)

'To lose our soul is to

lose the greatest treasure we have. We lose our souls when we are no longer alive to God and His love. We lose our souls when we place some other person or thing at the center of our life. ---A person once said that he had hit bottom, and couldn't handle his life any more. Upon hearing this, a friend congratulated him. "That's odd," said the troubled person. "You congratulate me because I have

hit bottom?" "That's right," replied the friend. "Because when you hit the bottom, you can't go any further down. Look up to Jesus in faith. Put your life in His hands and let Him pull you up from the bottom and place you where you belong – on top of life." (pg 118)

-- "But love your enemies." Luke 6:31-36. (pg 21) The acid test of love is not whether we love our friends, but whether we love our enemies. The acid test of love is how we communicate with our enemies. (Many a Greek village was saved from destruction by folk willing to provide food for their "enemy"/invaders - by sharing whatever they had as "part of the family".) "Love him for My sake, says Jesus, Love him "even as I have loved you." (Divine law means to seek balance as a matter of preservation; it's one of the great unchangeable "Forces Of Habit" that go without thinking or saying just DO.) We are to love people not because they are attractive but because they need love. The very fact that a person dislikes you may mean that he needs you. His soul is warped by his hatred of you, and you alone can warm him and free him. (pg 23) Another reason is fairly obvious. Returning hate for hate multiplies hate; forgiveness/ generosity offers slack and room for healing.

To love one's enemy is impossible unless one first loves God: He is the One who provides the resources required to establish peace. Peace is the result of the gift of the Holy Spirit dwelling in us!

-- A very constructive way of expressing grief is to let the tears flow. Jesus taught, "Blessed are those who mourn for they shall be comforted." Remember that Jesus wept when Lazarus died (John 11:35). He taught us that sorrow is natural; tears are an expression of love. St Paul wrote, "Do not grieve as others who have no hope". He was saying that we should grieve with Christian hope. (As a nurse, I think of saline - which tears are - as a healing agent, balm for the wounded soul.) As vulnerable human beings, especially in depths of grief - and even much later - we start to feel guilty about what we could or should have done differently. We are all frail and imperfect beings. Even as we accept God's forgiveness, we have to forgive ourselves, as our loved ones in the other world would surely forgive us – to be kind to ourselves instead of harsh critics. (pg 32)

--It is not only great oak trees that from tiny acorns grow; most ideas and thoughts grow (both by way of words and living example) from seeds that have been sown in our minds and hearts, how important then are thoughts sown in the mind!

Sow a thought, reap an act; Sow an act, reap a habit; Sow a habit, reap a character; Sow a character, reap a destiny.

--The parable of the Good Samaritan - "Go and do likewise (Luke 10:25-37).

We all are familiar with this story, one of the most unforgettable of Jesus' teachings, addressing the sin of omission. (pg 62)

I never cut my neighbor's throat; My neighbor's gold I never stole; I never soiled his house or land; But God have mercy on my soul! For I am haunted night and day - By all the deeds I have not done...

Jesus pointed out that religion is practiced not only in Church, but also on the roadside. The wounded are still with us. They are not just the physically wounded, but also those wounded by misery, unemployment, ghetto housing, racism, death, contempt, exploitation. He may not always be lying by the side of the road. They went by different names over the centuries: barbarians, gentile dog, infidel; but to Jesus, "brother". As a societal "melting pot", the U.S. is rife with group conflict and prejudice. The one who shows mercy is the true "neighbor" Jesus addressed. With so many in need, we tend to be anesthetized by sensory overload but that's no excuse for doing nothing - and surely not to be hateful, rationalizing weakness as their fault alone. Must we be put down in some way in order to restore our precious Christ-like soulful feeling? If so, oh to recognize when we are being tested and quickly learn our personal lesson.

In all things, give thanks; we have so very much to be truly grateful for!

Address of the Chairman His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios of America at the 8th Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America



Garfield, NJ (October 3-5, 2017)

Your Eminences, Your Excellencies and Your Graces, most respected Hierarchs of the Assembly of the Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America,

It constitutes a great joy and a profound blessing to be together again for our 8th annual General Assembly. Many of us have known each other not only since our First Episcopal Assembly in May 26-27, 2010, but long before. Our eight General Assemblies, however, have been special occasion for cultivating and strengthening the bond of deep love and apostolic zeal that unites us as canonical

Hierarchs of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church in America. Through God's grace and providence, we have all been brought together to this one place and we have been called to walk in unison toward a common goal, albeit, one that is still unfolding and which will be fully revealed in the eschaton. While our sights are ultimately set on the "things to come and longed for," as long as we call ourselves co-laborers in God's vineyard, it is our sacred obligation to work together to realize this goal by drawing ever-closer to one another.

This leads us to pay greater attention to the purpose of our meeting. Let us consider some basic points.

1. Cultivating the Bond of Love and the Unity in Christ

The first point related to the purpose of our Assembly is something self-understood. We are here to increase the love for each other, and to enhance our unity in Christ. This is a noble purpose in and of itself, but it also has a decisive impact on our work in presenting an authentic witness of Orthodoxy. Before His betrayal, arrest, imprisonment, crucifixion and death on the Cross, the Lord Jesus Christ reminded His disciples that when He is gone, the only way that the world will recognize that they are His disciples is by the love they have for one another. As you know, He said to His disciples, A new commandment I give to you that you love one another even as I have loved you that you also love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another (John 13:34-35). At the same time Christ prayed to His Father: Father I do not pray for those only but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they all be one even as You, Father, are in me and I in You, that they also may be one in us so that the word may believe that You have sent me (John 17:20-21). It is not simply that people will call themselves "Christians" that the world will know that they are followers of Christ. Only by their love - their sacrificial love - for one another and their unity in Christ will the estranged world pause and recognize in them the very light and life emanating from Christ and His Gospel. This unwaining light, which is present in the hearts, thoughts, and actions of love of true disciples of Christ, moves young and old to discover Jesus and to quench their spiritual thirst with His living water.

Our work together is, therefore, a methodical and intense spiritual exercise in building love and fortifying the bond of our unity in Christ. Such a

sacred task, as it happened today, starts and is perfected by our participation in the life-giving and unifying Cup, in the vivifying Body and Blood of Christ, in the Holy Eucharist. Our Liturgy today gave us the superb blessing of experiencing love and unity in Christ. I would like to personally thank our brother Metropolitan Evangelos of New Jersey, who eagerly and with great joy offered his parish of Saint George in Clifton, NJ, as the location for our opening Divine Liturgy. On this occasion, I also thank him for extending to us the assistance and service of his Metropolis staff and clergy, and for offering an Abrahamic hospitality to us all.

I should like also to express our gratitude to Bishop Basil and Metropolitan Antony for their untiring labors as Secretary and Treasurer, respectively, offered graciously to the Assembly. Their successors for the past year, since the last Assembly, Bishop Gregory and Archbishop Michael, have already shown remarkable zeal in performing their duties. Additional gratitude is offered to Bishop Maxim for coordinating the work of the Committees for the past seven years, and to the Presidents and members of our Committees.

2. Obligation to Organize and Function Better

The second point I should like to make is that the purpose of our coming together as members of our Episcopal Assembly of the United States is also our sacred duty as Hierarchs to organize and function according to the canonical norms and tradition that our Church Fathers wisely established throughout the centuries. It is our responsibility to walk according to the canonical prescriptions of our Church because these common ordinances help steer us and the faithful on the path to salvation. Our meeting, therefore, serves also as an opportunity to discover the challenges that force us to deviate at times from this path. Of course, our work and discussions around this matter have not been easy over the years. We have not always agreed on how we

ought to proceed with our internal organization and functioning. There have even been times when we thought that we have made important breakthroughs only to realize that we have far more work ahead of us than we ever could foresee. And while a consensus view of how Orthodoxy should be organized in the United States still evades us, we are most confident that by constantly investing our time and energy in the process, there will one day be enough room in our hearts to allow the Holy Spirit to lead to a spiritual and fruitful outcome. To this end, I offer special thanks to the Lord for the work of His Eminence Metropolitan Nicolae, who, together with the members of the Committee for Canonical Regional Planning, continues to study and present to us possible ways to enhance the way we function and organize ourselves as an Orthodox Church.

Dear brothers, if we are not committed to getting our own house in order; if we cannot find more effective ways to preach the Holy Gospel; if we have difficulties being patient with each other, then, what image of Christ and His Church are we sharing with the world? How can we expect the world to take refuge in the Arc of Salvation—the Church—when the image of the Church that is often publicly portrayed is that of disharmony?

3. Care for our Youth

My third and final point is the care for the Youth. Our purpose of coming together is to work on an authentic and common witness of Orthodoxy to the younger generation.

Certainly, a very important reason for us to gather each year from near and far for our annual assembly is the generation that still views the Church as their future and salvation. We often hear that the youth is the future of the Church, but there are so many young and emerging adults who look for a Church that is their future. Statistics show that there is a decline in the religious and spiritual lives of young people, but this does not mean that we can simply give up on those who struggle each day, longing for greater meaning in life than that offered to them by a

society that is largely materialistic. We must also not give up on our children who have found Jesus Christ but struggle to recognize Him in their daily lives. During the next few days, we will listen to presentations by Dr. Richard Flory and Dr. Ann Bezzerides who will offer us insights into the cultural trends affecting the Christian identity of our young people. They will explain to us in concrete terms what is not working, but will also highlight success stories across the US religious spectrum. We will also have the opportunity to watch a very intriguing video produced by Ancient Faith Films of the Antiochian Archdiocese, which portrays the thoughts and beliefs of the so-called "nones," or the disconnected—those young men and women who, without being atheists, prefer not to be associated with any official religious community.

And all this will hopefully allow us, dear brothers, to ask ourselves whether we are part of the problem and if we are prepared to be part of the solution. Does our conduct help people find Christ when they look at us? Do we truly love one another or are we still allowing grudges and agendas of various forms to stand in our way to connect to each other? How can we help young men and women understand that leadership requires sacrifice and service if we are not prepared to serve and sacrifice for each other?

My beloved brothers and concelebrants, as we convene for our work in New Jersey— let us not forget that this State is often referred to as the "Garden State." America recognizes New Jersey for its fertile soil, soil that bears great fruit and provides sustenance to millions of people. It is my wholehearted prayer, that just as the rain and sun nourish the fruit brought forth from this soil, our merciful God may water our souls, and shine upon our minds, enabling us to understand and fulfill the Words of Christ, Who said to His disciples, I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide (John 15:16). Amen.

Dealing with Conflict Without Violence - November, 2017

Welcome! This month we will talk about *Dealing with our Children's Conflicts Without Violence*. Our children watch television and they see news on social media as well. They know what violence is and how easy it is to have a conflict that spills over into violence. Unfortunately violence in today's society includes knives, guns, bats, and other weapons other than hand punches. Although we never

ever want to see our children involved in a conflict that involves violence, we should be aware of what conflicts our children have with others. It is also a month before many holidays and conflicts do come up! It is also a month for us to be grateful that we have our church community and when our children do have a problem, they can reach out.

Has your child been the victim of the one being teased in Greek School, Sunday School, GOYA, or his/her regular school? Was your child the aggressor?

Many times our children try to resolve their problems themselves and do not come to us, the parents, because we tend to over-react as "Greek Parents".

We also must learn to deal with conflicts without violence, and teach our children how to avoid conflict. Below are some suggestions that I made in an article about ten years ago that never go sour, and need to be reinforced especially in today's modern society.

We must have a positive attitude and not immediately blame our child, or the other child for the conflict. Did your child say that he/she did not start the argument? Listen to his/her story, and do not take sides. With younger children, taking a positive attitude always works; with a teen, of course you will be told, "you don't understand".

If you can, talk it out. Listening to the point of view of your children is very important. Do not yell, blame others, or say you understand, because you don't! You can say you understand why there is anger and say you are feeling their pain because you've been through it, but try to talk about "negotiations".

Negotiation means coming up with ideas for solutions; it is looking at the pros and cons of each solution; it is



choosing a solution that both sides in the conflict can live with.

Have your children come home only to throw things around, lock themselves in their room, or act in a way that you know they are angry? Anger is a natural response to conflict—so assume there was a conflict. Of course you will be blamed — but the conflict for now is internal for your

child, and probably happened outside your home. Encourage your angry child to be alone for a while – encourage him/her to breathe deeply to calm down – take time to get control of feelings – exercise to blow off steam – write feelings in a journal – then, talk over his/her feelings with you, the parent who has unconditional love for their child no matter who is right or wrong.

Once talking, encourage peaceful solutions by making a compromise; sometimes giving in to what the other person wants even when you know you're right. Yes, agree to disagree.

Once you have listened and your child has talked with you, make some suggestions. If it looks like the conflict is turning violent, encourage your children to walk away. Of course with adolescents this looks like defeat, being a wimp, not being able to take it, etc., but is it worth getting beaten up for? With younger children, the pain is intense when there is a conflict and hurt feelings cause a loss of self-esteem. Young children do walk away, but they don't forget. They feel bullied. You know your children better than anyone else. *Talk to them!*

If you see that your children are being bullied or harassed *GET HELP*. Encourage your young child or teen not to try to negotiate with someone who is bullying or hurting him or her. Encourage them to tell a responsible adult. If it is happening in Greek School or Sunday School, hopefully the teacher will see what is going on and they will let you, the parents, know immediately. In GOYA, advisors do see things parents do not see, and again, the parent should be notified. Together, parents and teachers, parents and advisors,

can decide together what solutions can be brought about so that the child does not decide to "quit Greek School, Sunday School, or GOYA".

If the harassment is going on in the regular school, decide with your child if it is best for them to stand up for themselves and tell the "bully" to stop, (this takes strong character and younger children cannot do this), or if another person should step in, (administrator, counselor, etc.).

Conflict can be prevented. They happen to everyone, but they can be worked out without violence. Here are some suggestions:

- Treat everyone with respect
- Tolerate differences
- Respect property
- Think before acting

- Do not tease, put down or make fun of others
- Take responsibility for your actions
- Keep your pride in check and don't let pride, shame, or embarrassment keep you from doing the right thing
- And, last but not least...always PRAY and know Jesus is there for us.

See how easy it can be to prevent conflict? Now parents, before we embark on all of these issues above, are we taking our own advice? We must set examples for our children. Adolescents, especially, are the first who will point out to us that we are hypocrites. It is also okay to admit we've made mistakes and that we have learned from our mistakes and we do not want our children to repeat them. Our children will respect that. So get out there and be a parent! You go parents! We rock!

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
