

write this as we are approaching the New Ecclesiastical Year and I am thinking about the confusing times we live in. We have so much happening in our lives like taking care of children, or aging relatives, work obligations, various activities, volunteering at church or in town, etc., and of course add to all of this that we are trying to make sense of the whole Coronavirus Pandemic as it seems to invade affect every aspect of life. The only other



It is against this backdrop that we enter the New Ecclesiastical Year and I write this letter with concern in my heart. My concern is for the future of Saint Andrew and the salvation of our community members. I feel like our connection to one another and to the community is becoming weakened I had these feelings even before the Coronavirus outbreak happened. I am concerned because I can see the secularization of society and the fact that Sunday is no longer a day dedicated to the Lord. So many activities associated with school and the community at large are being scheduled on Sunday morning and our community members were being pulled in. Or should I say being pulled away from the life of the community. Recently, we added to this situation the



Coronavirus Pandemic which has complicated things even more. Keeping priorities in life straight and not being tempted to be conformed to the standards of this world is a struggle. It seems world that the seemingly penalizes us when we try to follow the teachings of our church. I say seemingly because the so-called punishments of this world cannot compare to the blessings of our Lord's Heavenly Kingdom. Its, hard to stay strong in the face of pressure from

coaches, neighbors, friends, relatives, and even your own children.

As a leader and shepherd of this community, I have a growing concern for the families and parishioners of Saint Andrew that these pressures to alter our priorities are pulling some of us away. Or, the restrictions of the Coronavirus and the fear caused by it, also keep people away.

It is my hope that everyone will consider that all of the activities and pursuits of this present world and even the Coronavirus itself are all temporary. In a year or two, the pandemic will be in the past. It will be something we tell our children and grandchildren about. Activities and hobbies and sports are here to make life interesting and fun or to help us stay healthy while we are here. The only thing that is not temporary is God Himself. Our God and our faith in Him are the only things in this

life that are forever. The purpose of this life on earth is for us to learn to live in a more Christlike way and come closer to God and one another as a community through communal prayer, i.e. sacraments, acts of charity, learning and even socializing. Doing these things together as a church community creates a community of love. A community of love where everyone belongs and shares the love of Christ with those who are in the community and those who are part of the community at large. The actualization of this vision brings the reality of God's Heavenly Kingdom into our everyday lives. Activities and hobbies can be part of our spiritual growth when

kept in proper perspective, but when they take over and interfere with our spiritual life, they become a dangerous impediment to our salvation. The Lord tells us in Matthew chapter 6:33-34, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you. ³⁴ Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day *is* its own trouble." So, keep your priorities straight, put God first and seek the righteousness of His Kingdom and be careful not to put faith and trust in the things of this world. This world and all things of this world are only temporary.

- 12:30pm Asbury Park Beach: Trisagion at the Patriarch Athenagoras Statue, Procession to the Water, the Blessing of the Waters, and the Diving for the Cross by the Youth
- Following the diving for the Cross the buses for the Youth will depart back to St. George *Please note that this year there will be no BBQ following the event.

Hellenic Afternoon School

Dear Parents and Guardians,

I hope you and your families are doing well and enjoyed the summer. We are prepared for a great school year and look forward to seeing everyone in-person. Although we will be in-person and may continue to face some challenges, we will proceed to follow all safety measures according to the New Jersey Department of Health and follow the decisions made by the Randolph School District. In June 2021, the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) and the New Jersey Department of Health (NJDOH) published "The Road Forward – Health and Safety Guidance for the 2021-2022 School Year", a guidance document to assist New Jersey school districts in planning to provide full-day, in-person instruction and operations for the 2021-2022 school year. This plan is aligned with the requirements outlined in the document and includes the school district's unique and locally developed protocols to ensure our schools reopen safely and are prepared to accommodate staff and students' unique needs during this unprecedented time. This plan also adheres to all current Executive Orders of the Governor of New Jersey and are subject to change.

We are limiting the amount of people in the building to only staff, students, and volunteers. We will continue to wear masks in the classroom and ask parents to drop off their children at the office entrance. Parents/caregivers shall monitor their children for signs of illness every day. Staff shall conduct a daily health self-screening each day. Students and staff who are sick or exhibiting signs/symptoms of COVID 19 should not report to school.

The HAS program will continue Greek school every Monday and Thursday as each level will continue once a week of two-hour instruction. The HAS program is split into two groups.

- **Group 1** are levels Jr. Pre- K, Pre-K, Kindergarten, level 1, and level 2.
- **Group 2** are levels 3, level 4, level 5, and level 6.
- **Group 1** will meet every **Monday** (starting on Sept. 13) from 4:30 to 6:30 PM.
 - o Jr Pre-K Monday (starting on Sept. 13) from 4:30 to 6:00 PM.
- **Group 2** will meet every **Thursday** (starting on Sept. 9) from 4:30 to 6:30 PM.
- *Additionally, we are adding an optional one-hour conversation class on Monday and Thursday.
 - **Group 1** will have a **one-hour conversation** class every **Thursday** from 4:45 to 5:45 PM.
 - Group 2 will have a one-hour conversation class every
 Monday from 5:30 PM. to 6:30 PM
 - *DANCE GROUP 1 (AGES 5 TO 7) AND DANCE GROUP 2 (AGES 8 TO 11).
 - *Greek dance will be every **Thursday** starting on September 16, 2021.
 - * DANCE GROUP 1 will begin at 5:45 to 6:30 PM
 - * DANCE GROUP 2 will begin at 6:30 to 7:15 PM

A reminder to keep and bring back all student's Greek books from the previous year for use in the upcoming school year. We look forward to seeing our students for another successful school year!

Dear Parents and Students

Welcome to our new and returning families!

The goal of the Religious Education School is to show our children how to lead Christian lives. The Religious Education teacher supplements and reinforces the work of the priest and the parents in educating the child to know Jesus Christ and His Church. Our first concern is that the child learns about his Saviour, Jesus Christ. Using His teachings as our foundations we bring the child to know and practice his Orthodox faith. Each teacher in the Religious Education School is not only a source of religious information to the child, but also one of the child's prime examples of Christian behavior.

We are fortunate to have a dedicated, conscientious, and responsible group of volunteers who will spend each week preparing a lesson to teach our children on Sunday. However, they can only be with them for a mere one-hour a week. Family involvement is essential to a child's religious growth and development. As parents you can:

- Encourage prompt and regular attendance to Divine Liturgy on Sunday.
- Ask your children what was learned in class and discuss the lesson.
- Show an interest in your children's projects and take-home work.
- Encourage your children to do their assignments and help them if help is needed.
- Worship together as a family even when classes are not in session, it helps the children realize that church worship and Religious Education School go together.

Άγιος Φωκάς Ιερομάρτυρας ο Θαυματουργός:

Τι γιορτάζουμε 22 Σεπτεμβρίου

Άγιος Φωκάς Ιερομάρτυρας ο Θαυματουργός: Ο Άγιος Φωκάς έζησε στις αρχές του 2ου αιώνα, κατά τα χρόνια του αυτοκράτορα Τραϊανού (98 - 117). Κατάγονταν από την Σινώπη του Πόντου. Ο πατέρας του Πάμφυλος (ναυπηγός στο επάγγελμα) και η μητέρα του Μαρία, μετέδωσαν από την παιδική του ηλικία τη φλόγα της θερμής και αγνής πίστης τους και την μεγάλη ευσέβειά τους.

Τα παιδικά χρόνια

Ο Άγιος Φωκάς, από μικρό παιδί εντρυφούσε στην ανάγνωση των Ιερών Γραφών και εκείνο που ιδιαίτερα τον διέκρινε ήταν η θερμή και ειλικρινή αγάπη που είχε προς το Θεό, αλλά και προς τους συνανθρώπους του. Γιατί οδηγό στην αγάπη του αυτή είχε πάντα τα θεόπνευστα λόγια της Αγίας Γραφής, που λέει: «Εκείνος που αγαπά τον αδελφό του, μένει μέσα στο πνευματικό και ηθικό φως. Ενώ εκείνος που μισεί τον αδελφό του, μένει μέσα στο πνευματικό και ηθικό και ηθικό σκοτάδι».

Ο Άγιος Φωκάς, με την αγάπη που τον διέκρινε, διέδιδε τον λόγο του Θεού και της χριστιανικής πίστης στο πλήρωμα της εκκλησίας της Σινώπης και παρηγορούσε με τα λόγια του, όλους τους χριστιανούς που είχαν ανάγκη στήριξης. Οι ευσεβείς χριστιανοί του πρότειναν να γίνει ιερέας, πράγμα που ο Άγιος Φωκάς δέχθηκε.

Αναδείχθηκε Επίσκοπος

Μετά από λίγο καιρό, αναδείχθηκε Επίσκοπος της Σινώπης και ευτύχησε να έχει το χάρισμα της επιτέλεσης θαυμάτων στο όνομα του Τριαδικού Θεού. Κήρυττε άφοβα το Ευαγγέλιο και με τα θαύματα που έκανε, κατόρθωσε να φέρει πολλούς ειδωλολάτρες στην αληθινή πίστη. Ανέπτυξε έντονη ιεραποστολική δραστηριότητα, όχι μόνο στην περιοχή της Επισκοπής του, αλλά και πέρα από

αυτή, γεγονός που δεν πέρασε απαρατήρητο σε κάποιους φανατικούς ειδωλολάτρες.

Καταγγέλθηκε στον έπαρχο της περιοχής Αφρικανό, ο οποίος διέταξε την σύλληψή του, όπως και έγινε. Αφού παρουσιάστηκε μπροστά του, σε ερώτηση που του έγινε, ομολόγησε ότι πιστεύει στον Έναν και μόνο αληθινό Θεό, τον Ιησού Χριστό. Ύστερα από αυτήν του την ομολογία, ο έπαρχος άρχισε να βρίζει τον Χριστό και προσπάθησε να χτυπήσει τον Άγιο Φωκά. Τότε έγινε ένας τρομερός σεισμός και ο έπαρχος έπεσε αμέσως κάτω νεκρός, όπως επίσης και οι στρατιώτες του. Τότε ο Άγιος Φωκάς, μετά από τις παράκληση της γυναίκας του έπαρχου, ανάστησε τον Αφρικανό και τους άντρες του.

Τα βασανιστήρια

Μετά από αυτό το γεγονός οι φανατικοί ειδωλολάτρες γεμάτοι μίσος για αυτή του την πράξη, τον οδήγησαν στον αυτοκράτορα, που περιόδευε εκείνη την εποχή στην επαρχία του Πόντου. Αλλά και μπροστά στον αυτοκράτορα, ο Άγιος Φωκάς ομολόγησε και πάλι την πίστη του στον Θεό. Αμέσως τότε, ο αυτοκράτορας διέταξε να τον βασανίσουν. Πρώτα τον κρέμασαν από ένα ξύλο και του έσκισαν το σώμα με σιδερένια νύχια και μετά τον έριξαν μέσα σε ένα λάκκο με ασβέστη. Ο Άγιος Φωκάς υπέμενε καρτερικά όλα αυτά τα βασανιστήρια και ευλογούσε τους βασανιστές του. Με την δύναμη που του έδινε ο Θεός άντεξε τις δοκιμασίες αυτές και έμεινε σταθερός μέχρι τέλους. Ύστερα, τον έβαλαν σε μια δεξαμενή γεμάτη με βραστό νερό, όπου μετά από θερμή προσευχή στον Θεό, ο Άγιος Φωκάς παρέδωσε το πνεύμα του στον Κύριο. Η Εκκλησία μας εορτάζει και τιμά την ιερά μνήμη του στις 22 Σεπτεμβρίου.

Hieromartyr Phocas, Bishop of Sinope


Commemorated on September 22

The Holy Martyr Phocas the Gardener came from the city of Sinope on the southern shore of the Black Sea. Having a small garden, he lived modestly. He sold what he grew and supported himself on the proceeds. He helped the needy and paid for the housing of vagrants. The Christian piety of the saint had a great influence on other people. Even pagans deferred to him with deep respect. Under his influence they often abandoned their error and accepted the Christian Faith.

The governor of the district, aware that Saint Phocas was spreading Christian teachings, gave orders to find and kill him. The saint himself accidentally came upon those sent after him, and without revealing his name, he courteously received them, fed them and prepared a place for them to spend the night.

At night he went into the garden, then prepared a grave and a place for his burial. He even made arrangements for all his possessions to be distributed to the poor after his death. In the morning Saint Phocas declared to the strangers that it was he for whom they were searching and told them to fulfill the duty entrusted to them. The visitors were distressed, not wanting to kill the kindly saint. They felt honor bound to spare Saint Phocas, but he would not hear of it, and humbly bent his head beneath the sword. After fierce torture they enclosed Saint Phocas in a hot bath, where he died a martyr's death in the year 117.

They buried the holy Martyr Phocas in the grave that he himself had prepared in the garden. The place of his burial was glorified by miracles, and later a church was built there. In the year 404, the relics of the Saint Phocas were transferred to Constantinople (July 22).



An accurate account of the martyr's death was collected by Asterius of Amasea (+ 410). The holy Martyr Phocas is especially venerated as a defender against fires, and by seafarers he is called upon by those traveling by sea.

Troparion

Your holy martyr Phocas, O Lord, / through his sufferings has received an incorruptible crown from You, our God. / For having Your strength, he laid low his adversaries, / and shattered the powerless boldness of demons. / Through his intercessions, save our souls!

Kontakion

(Podoben: "You sought the heights...") You appeared as a bright star announcing Christ with your radiance, / which is repulsive to this world, O Martyr Phocas; / extinguishing the allure of false gods, / you enlighten the faithful, / always interceding for us all.

Many children will be back in school in-person, and some will still be virtual as parents do have the right to keep them home in some school districts. Elementary students in New Jersey will still be required to wear masks as a precaution. Same with some secondary schools. Social distancing also may be a priority and of course cleanliness. Continue to encourage your children to read, ask teachers questions, and reach out when they need assistance. You too, parents! Communicate with the teachers!

- "Plan a route If your child walks or bikes to school walk the route and emphasize safety.
- Visit the school Try to meet the teacher too! Request a virtual visit if you wish.
- Set goals with your child Create frequent rewards for success.
- Make a schedule Set aside time each day for studying, reading, and playing
- Go to bed Sleep patterns change slowly. Get your child back to a regular schedule.
- Shake off the cobwebs Read a book together.
 Review last year's math skills. Practice neat handwriting.
- Create excitement Shop together for clothes and school supplies to get in the school spirit.
- Remember, your attitude is contagious Get excited about new teachers, friends, and opportunities and your child will too!"

GREEK ORTHODOX CHURCH & NATIONAL SHRINE



Beloved Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This year, on September 11th, we will observe the Twentieth Anniversary of the tragic day we call 9/11. It is a solemn day for our Nation and for the world, particularly in light of recent events in Afghanistan. It is worth remembering that the first commemoration of America's military response to 9/11, America's Response Monument (DE OPPRESSO LIBER [Latin for "from oppressed to free"], the motto of US Special Forces) sits in Liberty Park across from the Shrine. Most poignantly, it is sited directly above what was 155 Cedar Street, the location of the beloved little church that was destroyed when the South Tower collapsed. This confluence of events — the Twentieth Anniversary of 9/11 and the withdrawal of America from her longest conflict, make the significance of the Saint Nicholas National Shrine all the more meaningful, as we will be present on the eve of September 11th to offer our memorial prayers for all who perished that day, and in the subsequent decades as a result of those terrible attacks.

On September 10th, this twentieth year from 9/11, we will illuminate the rebuilt Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine from within for the very first time. As the suns sets and the day begins (as it says in Genesis 1:5: "AND THE EVENING AND THE MORNING WERE THE FIRST DAY"), we will shine the light of Christ, the light of our Orthodox Christian Faith, the Light that never can be overcome by darkness. And thus, we shall commence the ministry of love, of healing, of reconciliation, and of peace at Ground Zero.

Our place at Ground Zero, a place that was filled with death and destruction twenty years ago, is called to become all those virtues I just enumerated above, and more. Our ministry is a sacred duty that we have for all people who come to the rebuilt World Trade Center. We are the only religious space in the complex, and our Church and National Shrine will hold an awesome responsibility to provide the missing element of faith in the new reality of Ground Zero.

The light that will shine forth that night and every night to come will bear witness to the love of God for all people, as it is so truly said, "it is far better to light a candle than to curse the darkness." The darkness that enveloped New York City that fateful day was fueled by the spiritual darkness that comes from hatred and ignorance. But one candle can dissipate the gloom, as we Orthodox Christians know so well on the Holy Night of Pascha. We pass the light to one another, as we sing: "Come receive the Light from the Unwaning Light, and glorify Christ Who is risen from the dead!"

This is now the mission of the Saint Nicholas National Shrine. To proclaim that Christ is the Light of the world, and to share that light with all people. What a unique privilege to do so in this place, the epicenter of 21st Century history! And what an awesome responsibility!

May Christ, Who is the True Light Who came into the world, make all of us worthy to be this light, even as we light the candle of love that is our Saint Nicholas National Shrine. May the memory of all who perished on 9/11, and all whose lives ended as a result of that day, be eternal.

Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew Interview With ukrinform.ua

"I am going to Kyiv with a message of love and unity, a prayer for all who live in Ukraine."

His Holiness Bartholomew, Archbishop of Constantinople - New Rome and Ecumenical Patriarch will arrive in Ukraine tonight. This is his third visit to our country. His Holiness visited Odessa in September 1997 and Kyiv in July 2008, but this visit is special in that it is the first since the Orthodox Church of Ukraine received autocephaly and coincides with the 30th anniversary of our independence.

In this exclusive interview, His Holiness, Archbishop of Constantinople - New Rome spoke to Ukrinform about the formation of the Orthodox Church of Ukraine, its development and growing strength, about efforts by outside forces, responses, and related challenges, and about the pandemic and the Mother Church's stance towards vaccination.

THE MOTHER-CHURCH HAS FELT CONCERN FOR THE UKRAINIAN CHURCH FOR A THOUSAND YEARS

- Your Holiness, your first visit to Ukraine since the Orthodox Church of Ukraine received the Tomos of Autocephaly begins today. What is the program and what are the expectations from this - First of all, I would like to note that I am visiting Ukraine at the invitation of the President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelensky to take part in the celebration of the 30th anniversary of the Proclamation of Independence and to share the joy of the Ukrainian people on this occasion. I also received an official invitation from His Beatitude Metropolitan Epiphany of Kyiv and All Ukraine. I am convinced that I will rejoice in the progress of the newly created Orthodox Church of Ukraine. The Mother Church of Constantinople, from which more than 1,000 years ago your ancestors were baptized into Christianity at the request of St. Volodymyr, has never ceased to show interest in and concern for all of you and your local Church. Relations between Constantinople and Kyiv have remained strong and unshakable for ten centuries, and today they are more relevant than ever. I want to convey through this interview a message of love and unity to the clergy, faithful, and all brothers and sisters in Ukraine, who I look forward to meeting in person.



THE CHURCH CANNOT BE TERRORIZED; LIES AND DEFAMATION STRENGTHEN OUR FAITH

- Your Holiness, we are grateful to you for your attention, support, and care for the Orthodox Church of Ukraine. Are you satisfied with its progress and current development? What advice would you give to strengthen the Orthodox Church of Ukraine?
- We are very pleased with everything that has been achieved in the Orthodox Church of Ukraine from the granting of the Tomos of Autocephaly to the present day. We are proud of the ministry and testimony of this Church, without hiding the fact that it has become the object of ruthless acts of defamation and lies by certain circles that do not want there to be an Orthodox Church in Ukraine independent from external influences.

The Mother Church, the Ecumenical Patriarchate, also experiences everything that the Orthodox Church of Ukraine suffers from. Unfortunately, some people seem to be accustomed to lying and committing religious abuses, thinking that in this way they are intimidating the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the local autocephalous churches, and the newly formed Orthodox Church of Ukraine. However, Christianity cannot be threatened. The church cannot be terrorized. Lying and defamation

do not upset us; to the contrary, they strengthen our faith in the canons, traditions, and Truth of the Church. His Beatitude Metropolitan Epiphany of Kyiv is a prudent primate who knows how to manage church affairs effectively and in the spirit of the canonical tradition of Orthodoxy. We trust him and have optimistic hope for the future of the Orthodox Church of Ukraine. I urge him to continue to follow the straight path, the one that leads to education of the faithful and to unity.

THOSE WHO DOUBT THE CANONICITY OF THE AUTOCEPHALY OF THE OCU ARE NOT GUIDED BY ECCLESIASTICAL CRITERIA

- What would you say to the brothers and sisters of the Moscow Patriarchate who are convinced that the autocephaly of the Orthodox Church of Ukraine is "uncanonical" or "defective"
- The problem with such people is that it is difficult for them to recognize reality, or that they refuse to recognize it. They are also ignorant of what autocephaly means, of its history and canonical practice. The Russian Church, to which they aspire to belong, received its autocephalous and patriarchal statuses from the Ecumenical Patriarchate. Why then do they not want to acknowledge that the same canonical justification of autocephaly which was validly applied to grant autocephaly and patriarchal status to the Russian Orthodox and other Orthodox Churches by the Ecumenical Patriarchate is in the same way valid for the Orthodox Church of Ukraine? The intercession of the Ecumenical Patriarchate is not uncanonical, rather it is their questioning of this intercession which is uncanonical. Clearly, they are not at all interested in canonical order, because in this instance they are clearly weighing the interests of foreign powers over ecclesiastical criteria.

REFUSAL OF VACCINATION IS NOT BASED ON THEOLOGICAL OR SCIENTIFIC GROUNDS

- The world community is actively fighting the coronavirus. In the Orthodox world, there are those who oppose vaccination, wearing masks, and maintaining social distance. What is the attitude of the Mother Church towards vaccination? Were you and those around you vaccinated?
- The current great crisis in the field of healthcare affects Orthodox Christians along with all of humankind. Of course, we are being criticized for dealing with and fighting against the pandemic by supporting the development of useful vaccines and other countermeasures. However, the refusal of vaccination and other protective

measures is irrational and unjustified by theological or scientific criteria. I have said from the beginning that the pandemic threatens our faithful, but not our faith. It is a fact that a large number of believers who refused protective measures have become victims of this virus. That is why it is unacceptable in the face of so many victims and so much suffering to deny the existence of a pandemic, to regard it as created by someone, or to spread conspiracy theories. Unfortunately, this attitude shows indifference to others. However, anything that contradicts the commandment to love one's neighbor cannot be the will of God. The Church of Constantinople encourages the faithful to consult with their doctors and to vaccinate according to their instructions. Naturally, all of us at the Phanar, including myself, have been vaccinated.

SCIENCE IS A BLESSING FROM GOD, BECAUSE IT SERVES HUMANITY

- The Coronavirus has caused a large number of deaths. Suddenly, many of us have experienced the sudden illness or loss of loved ones. What do you advise to elevate us morally? What are the best means to support ourselves and our families?
- This is not the first time the Church has faced a pandemic. And each time the answer was prayer and observance of directed countermeasures. Today, science is proving that it can find solutions quickly and efficiently. Of course, there are limitations to scientific knowledge; but, because science serves humanity, it is a blessing from God. We gratefully accept this divine gift. Therefore, we are grateful to the scientists who have so quickly developed vaccines that protect us from the complications of the coronavirus. Moreover, we thank the doctors and other health professionals around the world who work daily to save people and fight Covid-19. I know that the doctors and other medical professionals in Ukraine are also doing their utmost to save patients. We greet them, bless them, and assure them that they are in our prayers, asking our Savior Christ to sustain their efforts. We also pray daily that God will give peace to the souls of the victims of this pandemic and comfort to their families.....




