

### Fresh Air

Nowadays we hear a lot about clean air and taking care of the environment. This is a really important topic because caring for the earth is our Christian responsibility. It isn't a political issue, but it is a responsibility given to us by God from the time He created humankind. (Genesis 1:26) The idea of breathing dirty air is something that I remember from my childhood. I remember driving past the steel



When I happen to smell air that is dirty and smokey it is like a cloud that blocks my breathing, my sight, and creates a fog all around me. I can compare it to the spiritual life.

In our spiritual life we can be clouded up with so many cares, problems and worries of everyday life. These cares, problems and worries swirl around in our heads causing us to choke on the difficulties and problems we are dealing with in life. My worries and cares are different than your worries and cares but all of us have something that we are dealing with that causes us concern and weighs us down. But where do we turn for clearing the smog that clouds our ability to deal with the cares, difficulties and problems of life. I think the most important place we can turn to is our Orthodox Faith and the church.



I believe that coming to Church is one of the great gifts our Lord has given us to bring back our busy lives to the fresh air of God's presence in our lives. Our souls hunger and long for His touch in our hearts. We want to live for him, to know him, to lift up our hearts unto our Lord. We dream of being able to drink deeply of his love and filling our souls with his peace. Can you

imagine to have the peace of God which passes all understanding? We wonder if this type of peace can be ours.

In the summer we take vacations from the routine of work, home and our many responsibilities. We need the opportunity to slow down and leave the cares, worries and concerns behind for short while. It is what one author calls sharpening the saw. He says a carpenter who uses a saw over and over again and again eventually causes it to become dull. Taking an opportunity to stop cutting and bring the saw blade to a sharpening stone means it will have to stop cutting for a while, but it also means that it will be more effective when it is sharpened and returns to work. That's what vacation can be for us; an opportunity to rest and recharge so that when we come back to life and work, we can be more effective.

Many of us take a vacation from church and church services during the summer as well. I don't see the benefit to this type of break. The reason I say this is because when we don't come to church and pray this causes us to be farther away from God. It breaks

our prayer routine that creates a stable and a consistent relationship between us and God. It's a relationship that we all need. A relationship that helps us clear the air of our life and to see more clearly how to better live and conduct ourselves.

This fall, many of us are returning to church after being away, in some cases, for months. Some of us have thought of the faith and our church as being an activity like soccer, school, or dance lessons, or piano, in which we take a break during the summer. But our Orthodox Christian Faith is certainly more than just an activity or something that we take a break from. Our Christian Faith is a way of life; it should be a guiding force in our daily interactions with others. Our Faith and our church should be the place we go to regain spiritual strength; to live our lives in ways that Glorify God. It is a place to get fresh air and clear smog from our head and have the Divine Breath of God within us.

#### Dear fellow Parishioners:

The attached financial summary through July 2022 predictably shows that we are starting to feel the effects of the absence of the cushion afforded by the PPP loans received during the first two years of the pandemic. At the end of July, we barely had enough cash for a single month's worth of bills. As of this writing in mid-August, our cash levels do not even support operations for a single month. A big summer drop-off is normal for us, but church attendance seems much lower this year than in summers past, and we are seeing that in our donation levels.

Unfortunately, our festival net of \$62,000 is almost half of what we normally experienced prior to the pandemic because of reduced visitors and much higher food costs. Our utility expenses are also 25% higher for electric, and 50% higher for gas.

As we get beyond the summer doldrums, please consider resuming your Stewardship commitments. Also consider supporting our upcoming fundraisers: the car raffle, September gyro sale and November 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration.

**Dear Parents and Students**

Welcome Back to St. Andrew Church!!!

The goal of the Religious Education School is to show our children how to lead Christian lives. The Religious Education teacher supplements and reinforces the work of the priest and the parents in educating the child to know Jesus Christ and His Church. Our first concern is that the child learns about his Saviour, Jesus Christ. Using His teachings as our foundations we bring the child to know and practice his Orthodox faith. Each teacher in the Religious Education School is not only a source of religious information to the child, but also one of the child's prime examples of Christian behavior.

We are fortunate to have a dedicated, conscientious, and responsible group of volunteers who will spend each week preparing a lesson to teach our children on Sunday. However, they can only be with them for a mere one-hour a week. Family involvement is essential to a child's religious growth and development. As parents you can:

- Encourage prompt and regular attendance to Divine Liturgy on Sunday.
- Ask your children what was learned in class and discuss the lesson.
- Show an interest in your children's projects and take-home work.
- Encourage your children to do their assignments and help them if help is needed.
- Worship together as a family even when classes are not in session, it helps the children realize that church worship and Religious Education School go together.

Teach a child how he should live, and he will remember it all his life. (Proverbs 22:6)

Church and home go hand in hand. **Share the Experience.** Classes are as follows:

Divine Liturgy: Parents and children should be in church on time

Altar Boys should be in church 5 minutes before liturgy begins

Students & Teachers will receive Holy Communion and then proceed to their Classes.

#### **GRADUATES 2022**


Antoni Bulko has grown up always being an active member of the St. Andrew's

#### **CONCEPTION OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST (September 23)**

#### **Birth of John the Baptist**

#### Story Overview:

A priest and his wife were well beyond the years when it is possible to give birth to a child. The angel, Gabriel, gave Zechariah the incredible news that his wife, Elizabeth, would give birth to a son who would become a great preacher. They were to name the baby John.

#### Background Study:

Zechariah and his wife, Elisabeth were Jews who patiently waited for God to rescue and restore his people. Zechariah was a priest and both he and his wife were from the priestly line of Aaron (Exodus 28:1, 43; 1 Chronicles 24:19). Though married for many years, this couple had never been blessed with a child. This would have been both disappointing and humiliating for a Jewish couple of that time.

The priestly groups took turns in temple service. Zechariah's group was serving at this time. Within the group the priests chose lots (similar to drawing straws) to decide who was to perform certain temple duties. In today's story, Zechariah was chosen and he had the honour of burning incense in the temple. While the priest burned incense, he was to pray. The people worshipping outside in the temple court were to pray also. Zechariah was supposed to be alone in the temple. As he prayed, he was suddenly aware of an angel standing near him at the right of the altar. Seeing Zechariah's fright, the angel told him not to fear because his prayer had been heard. His wife would give birth to a son who would be filled with the Holy Spirit. They were to name him John (which means "the Lord is gracious"). The prayers of Zechariah for Israel's salvation were beginning to be answered.

Poor Zechariah. It was too wonderful to believe, and he questioned the angel. (Luke 1:18-20). For this reason, Zechariah was struck dumb. He left the temple and returned to Elizabeth. She became pregnant.



#### Mary's Visit:

(Luke 1:26-56) During Elizabeth's pregnancy, she was visited by her young cousin, Mary, from Nazareth. When Elizabeth first greeted Mary she felt her own baby inside of her womb "jump." Even her own unborn child recognized that something special was happening with Mary. Young Mary was also pregnant.

It turns out that Zechariah was not the only one who had received a visit from an angel. The angel, Gabriel, had also visited Mary to tell her that she was pregnant with a baby that would be called Jesus. As if a virgin becoming pregnant was not enough, Gabriel also revealed to Mary that her cousin, Elizabeth, was pregnant in her old age. An elderly woman being pregnant also seemed impossible, but the angel had assured Mary that "nothing is impossible with God."

Now, at Elizabeth's house, despite one woman being elderly and the other very young these two women shared a special bond. During Mary's visit, and before she returned to Nazareth, these two women shared about the amazing things that had been happening to them and worshiped God. In these verses we read what is called "Mary's song".

Mary left to return to Nazareth when Elizabeth was nearing her due date.

#### John is Born

Elizabeth gave birth to a son. The neighbors had been puzzled by Zechariah's inability to speak and were even more puzzled when Elizabeth wanted to name the child John instead of after his father or a relative. Even though Zechariah was still unable to speak he asked for something to write on and wrote, "His name is John."

Suddenly Zechariah was able to speak and he began to praise God and prophesy. First he praised God for visiting and redeeming his people. Zechariah said that the Messiah was soon to come to bring salvation to His people. Now all the prophecies and covenants would be fulfilled. Zechariah's son, John,

was to be the one who would prepare the way for this Messiah. Later it is Jesus who is revealed to be this Messiah.



#### Η ΣΥΛΛΗΨΗ ΤΟΥ ΑΓΙΟΥ ΙΩΑΝΝΟΥ ΤΟΥ ΠΡΟΔΡΟΜΟΥ (23 Σεπτεμβρίου).

Ο Ιωάννης ο Πρόδρομος ήταν υιός του ιερέως Ζαχαρίου και της Ελισάβετ. Γεννήθηκε έξη μήνες προτού γεννηθεί ο Χριστός και έγινε Πρόδρομος του Κυρίου και Βαπτιστής Του.

Οι γονείς του Προδρόμου ήσαν ευσεβείς και θεοφοβούμενοι, άλλα άτεκνοι. Ποθούσανε ολόψυχα ν' αποστήσουνε ένα παιδί. Άπειρες και θερμές ήταν οι προσευχές τους στο Θεό, για την εκπλήρωση αυτής της γλυκείας επιθυμίας.

Ο χρόνος όμως κύλησε, χωρίς καμιά θεϊκή απάντηση στο ποθητό τους αίτημα. Ο Ζαχαρίας έκανε πάντοτε την Ιερατική του λειτουργία στο Ναό του Σολομώντος. Σύμφωνα δε με την συνήθεια, που επικρατούσε τότε στο Ιερατείο, ο Ιερεύς ο οποίος

θα προσέφερε θυμίαμα στο θυσιαστήριο των θυμιαμάτων διαλεγόταν με κλήρο.

Μια μέρα, λοιπόν, ο κλήρος έπεσε στον Ιερέα Ζαχαρία. Τότε αυτός προχώρησε μέσα στο Ναό του Κυρίου, για να προσφέρει το θυμίαμα, ενώ πλήθος κόσμου ήταν συγκεντρωμένο και προσευχότανε εκεί έξω από το Θυσιαστήριο.

Την ώρα, όμως που το θυμίαμα άρχισε ν' ανεβαίνει ανάλαφρα και να ευωδιάζει ο Ναός από το άρωμά του ο Ζαχαρίας είδε ένα αστραποβόλο Άγγελο να κάθεται στα δεξιά του Θυσιαστηρίου. Αμέσως τον κατέλαβε ταραχή και τον κυρίεψε ο φόβος.

Τότε ο Άγγελος με φωνή γλυκιά και καθησυχαστική του είπε. «Μή φοβοῦ Ζαχαρία, διότι εἰσηκούσθη ἡ

δέησίς σου, καί ἡ γυνή σου Έλισάβετ γεννήσει υἰόν σοί».

-Μη φοβάσαι, δηλ. Ζαχαρία. Δεν είναι για να φοβάσαι τούτη τη στιγμή, αλλά για να χαίρεσαι. Μεγάλη είδηση χαράς σου φέρνω: Η παράκληση σου, που έκανες στο Θεό τόσες φορές, εισακούστηκε. Η Ελισάβετ θα σου γεννήσει παιδί και θα το ονομάσεις Ιωάννη.

Ο Ζαχαρίας, όμως, ενώ ακούει αυτά τα ουρανόσταλτα λόγια, σκέφτεται την προχωρημένη ηλικία της γυναίκας του και την στειρότητά της. Σκέφτεται και τα δικά του γεράματα και ρωτάει τον Άγγελο με κάποια δυσπιστία:

—Με ποιο τρόπο, με ποιο σημάδι μπορώ να πιστέψω και να βεβαιωθώ αυτό που μου λες; Πώς να το πιστέψω αυτό, αφού κι εγώ είμαι γέροντας και η γυναίκα μου είναι περασμένη στα χρόνια;

Τότε ο Άγγελος του αποκρίθηκε; Εγώ είμαι ο Γαβριήλ. Είμαι ο Αρχάγγελος, που στέκομαι δίπλα στο Θεό για να τον υπηρετώ. Και είμαι


απεσταλμένος του Θεού να σου φέρω αυτές τις χαρούμενες ειδήσεις.

Αφού όμως ζητάς σημάδι, για να πιστέψεις, θα το έχεις. «Ίδού ἔση σιωπῶν καί μή δυνάμενος λαλῆσαι». Από χώρα μέχρις ότου γεννηθεί το παιδί, θα είσαι άλαλος και βουβός.

#### RETURN TO THE IMPOSSIBLE

September is a time of return. We are most familiar with going back to school, but for many, it also means going back to work after the summer vacations. Even Church attendance routinely suffers from the lack of worshippers during the summer months. According to the Orthodox Church, the liturgical year begins September 1st, although the real liturgical center is always the feast of Christ's Resurrection that

establishes the cycle of Orthodox worship. Yet, this sense of return has become a routine for many.

So - will there be a return? Will we once again see the Church filled with families eager to learn and worship? We are all aware that Covid has created a new social environment. Covid has created a deep fear in many of us, and it is this fear that has impacted on how we worship. You will recall how Peter, seeing Jesus walking on the water, beckoned Jesus to call him to walk on the water towards Jesus, but Peter's inability to keep his reality from accepting this impossible action caused him to sink. When he cried out to Jesus to save him, Jesus reached to him and said "Oh you of little faith, why did you doubt?" (Matthew 14:31). Each of lives a reality in which things like walking on water are simply impossible. Faith calls us into a new reality where the impossible ceases to function. Is not the very core of our Orthodox faith the Resurrection? How many people, living with



impossibilities in their reality, haven't tried to "explain" this event in terms of the possible, only to find themselves sinking?

Covid has certainly provided a great many reasons for leaving the Church but are we sinking as we lose sight of the Lord calling us to Him in the impossible? The Orthodox Church isn't a place that takes attendance in order to have a

passing grade to get into Heaven. It is a sacred space where God is present to each of us. It is Christ Himself who calls us to Him even when everything we might invent to keep us from drawing near to Him get in the way. After over two long years of exile from the life of the Church, we are called to return. We need spiritual food once again and our wells are drying out of living water.

Think a moment of an important event about to take place. Huge crowds gather to eagerly be part of this event. Some wear masks, others don't, and social distancing is impossible. But the urgency of being at such an important event cause many to abandon the fear that can no longer overcome the desire for being at this event. Suppose Christ Himself were to appear at St. Andrew! Who would not want to be there for this unbelievable event? But that's what happens every Sunday - Christ Himself is present in the Eucharist. The Church itself becomes the Kingdom "on earth as it is in Heaven".

You're all familiar with searches for long lost treasures in which the quest to find this treasure becomes a person's single focus. The Bible tells us of a man who sold everything to buy a field that contained a pearl of immeasurable valuable. One of the biggest reasons for many to simply set Church attendance aside is that the sense of treasure has been lost. There is a routine to our worship service but anyone who exercises knows that the slow addition of a new level of performing this routine brings reward, not doing the same routine. Routine provides each of us with a way to worship creatively each time we participate. What this means is that as we consider returning this Fall, we need to have the purpose for worshipping, for keeping our

eyes on Christ, to save us as we sink from the realities that ask us to accept the impossible for staying away.

Please come back! Bring your families, reengage in the learning Christian education St Andrew offers you and your family, and embrace the event of worship as the event of Christ's presence. Learn what it means to be in His presence as you come before Him in the Eucharist. The world will always try to convince you of the impossible, but with God "all things are possible"! Imagine life with such a promise!

#### **BRING THEM TO ME**

Jesus Is concerned about the 5,000 men plus women and children that are with him in the wilderness. His disciples tell him that all they have are five loaves and two small fish that a boy has offered. Jesus' response is the phrase, "Bring them to me." Jesus then takes the loaves, blesses and breaks them, and feeds 5,000 men plus women and children. We also bring what we have to Jesus. We offer bread and wine. He returns it to us as His blood body and Communion. We offer ourselves and we become the Church, His body on earth.



No matter how much we give, He cannot be outdone. Just like the boy who offered the loaves and the fish, if we offer what we have – however great or small our gift – with prayer and humility, God will receive our gifts and multiply them to feed His people.

#### Is It Time To Do Away With Sunday School?

Will our children choose to live as Orthodox Christians?

This is the most pressing question facing the Church today.

Over the years, the conventional path followed to form young people in the Orthodox Faith has included a Sunday school program. Today, it is a given that every parish needs a Sunday school in order to be considered successful. However, as more and more parishes face serious questions about their future, one must ask whether or not Sunday school has served our children well.

The answer to this question goes well beyond money. It should be noted that at no time in history has the Church in America devoted more resources to the education of its youth. A look at available budget data shows that national spending on education for the period of 2005-2016 will top \$8,200,000. Combine that figure with expenditures on youth ministry and family ministry and that figure balloons to an incredible \$17,600,000. Given these figures, you would think that our youth are thriving in the faith. However, this is hardly the case. Recent studies show that 60% of Orthodox college students leave the faith. Meanwhile, as many as 85% of marriages are now of the interfaith variety, with one spouse choosing not to be Orthodox. The reality confronting the Church today is that a family that is united in living the Orthodox faith is far more the exception than the norm. For many youth, Orthodoxy has become just another cafeteria-like choice between one parent's church or the other parent's church.


The greatest tragedy in the American Church today is that far too many parishes have alienated our youth by placing nostalgia before witness to Jesus Christ. Nostalgia can only sustain parishes for so long before demographic collapse sets in. As Orthodoxy comes to grips with this reality, it is evident that Sunday school programs have failed to provide the fundamentals needed to pass on the Orthodox Faith to a new generation. Despite the presence of dedicated volunteers and the best of intentions, change is needed.

Should parishes in America reconsider their Sunday school programs or eliminate them all together?

The answer to this question is a clear and resounding YES!

Today, many parishes have Sunday school programs that undermine the liturgical life of the Church and the unity of the family. The central message of Sunday school today is one of segregation, not integration. Parishes separate children from their families and place them in a classroom so as to teach them facts about the Church. This stunts their ability to experience the Church in all its depth and beauty. It also divides families at a time when they should be together the most – the Divine Liturgy. Sophie Koulomzin points this out clearly in *Our Church* Children. "..the and Our Sunday school movement proved to carry certain dangers within it.....The Sunday school replaced the Divine Liturgy, the classroom lesson replaced the Sacrament. Students graduating from Sunday school had not acquired the habit of going to church on Sundays. The life of worship, which is the essence of Orthodoxy, was thus undermined."

What are some of the signs Sunday school may be undermining the life of worship in a parish? Consider the following:



- Students show up late for Divine Liturgy, resulting in little actual time at worship before leaving for class.
- Teachers are often late to Divine Liturgy as well and sometimes even skip liturgy to teach Sunday school.
- Events like ethnic dancing and diocesan basketball tournaments take priority over the worship and witness of the Church.
- Rehearsals and planning for seasonal events like the parish Christmas pageant are held during Divine Liturgy.
- Graduating students lack the habit of attending Church regularly.
- Challenging social and moral questions are avoided for fear of offending people.
- Secular success is celebrated more than Christian witness. Service to the weak and vulnerable is discouraged as vocation or career.
- Teachers frown upon fidelity to the teachings of the Church. Zeal for Orthodoxy is viewed as strange.

There is no question that the above problems exist in a wide variety of parishes across America. If our children are going to choose to live as Orthodox Christians in the years to come, then they certainly deserve to encounter the Church in its fullness, much like the early disciples did. Orthodoxy is not simply classroom knowledge or ritual knowledge. Understanding the faith is not the equivalent of learning answers to trivia questions. The Church is a way of being that shows us how to be truly human. This cannot be learned in a classroom. It cannot be gleaned from a textbook. And it certainly cannot be passed on through an educational bureaucracy created by paid professionals. Orthodoxy is learned when it is experienced both at Liturgy and through the lives of others who witness to Jesus Christ with humility, compassion, and devotion.

Now that the crisis in Orthodox Sunday schools has been brought forward, here are three ways we can improve the quality of learning in parishes.

**English is Essential:** The complete use of English is for а healthy Church essential life America. Studies conducted by the Assembly of Bishops in the Unites States show that the use of English in the liturgy increases attendance and participation at liturgy by as much as 30%. Being able to understand the liturgy matters, especially and young people, converts, marriages. It is foolish to think we can pass on the experience of the life of the Church to our children if they constantly cannot understand the liturgy because it is in Greek or Ukrainian. A vibrant liturgical life in English is essential in helping our children grow into mature witnesses to the Faith who have a strong understanding of how the Church answers the questions proposed by life. Consistently participating in and understanding the Divine Liturgy is far more enriching than any number of classroom lessons.

More Mentoring: Orthodox Christians have mentored one another since the earliest of times. St. Paul's letters are a testimony to such work. Every Orthodox Christian needs a mentor, and every parish needs a mentoring program where healthy Orthodox Christians take up the responsibility of mentoring young people and new

arrivals. The best way to learn the fundamentals of Orthodox Christianity is to see it lived with joy by others. Imagine if all of the resources spent on Sunday school were dedicated to mentoring programs that formed relationships across generations that helped people grow in hospitality, humility, and service to the weakest among us. Nostalgia-centered parishes would have a very different feel than they do today.

Servant Leadership: Nothing undermines the Christian development of our youth more than leaders who do not live the Gospel. Love of power, wealth, and social status are all problems facing the Church. These problems must be overcome by ensuring that all leaders are first and foremost servant leaders who understand that real power in the Church comes from humility and service, not wealth or family legacy. Leadership begins at Liturgy, and Orthodox leaders educate our youth best when they model servant leadership both at Liturgy and outside our Liturgy. A servant role model provides a lifetime of lessons for a young person. These lessons are far more effective at communicating the Faith than any textbook.

Confronting the Sunday school crisis in Orthodox parishes today is no easy task. No doubt much emotion is tied to this issue. However, to ignore the need to change is to risk having our youth live – according to the warning of St. Justin Popovich – "as fireflies in a universe of darkness." America's Orthodox youth deserve better than such an impoverished existence.

St. John Chrysostom, who wrote, "With Christians everything should be secondary compared to our concern with children, and their upbringing in the instruction and teaching of the Lord."

Our youth are not only part of the Church of the future; they are more importantly part of the Church of today!

#### **SECULARISM**

Secularism is a very subtle and dangerous enemy. It does not seem like an enemy at all, but rather a way for the church to become in touch with the world.

In the 1920's the Orthodox Church of Russia was confronted with a very difficult situation: whether to tacitly support the Communist government or oppose it. To some Orthodox Christians in Russia the church made the wrong choice and decided that it would not oppose the Communist government even though many of the church's clergy and people were being persecuted and martyred. In response to the official church's compromise Archpriest Victor S. Potapov wrote: the Church's path like the earthly path of Jesus is not the path of accommodation, but is the way of Golgotha. A powerful statement! The church cannot and must not in any way compromise (accommodate) her teachings for the sake of her safety. Today, we face a similar and more subtle persecution, a spirit of compromise with our culture and the teachings and philosophy of that culture. As with communism, the church cannot accommodate modern society. We cannot accept everything our culture teaches or accepts as legal. Many things may be deemed legal by society and government but it does not make it moral and right. The church cannot to try to accommodate the culture. The Church of Christ must rise above this and every culture and society and be true to the Gospel. The church works and lives in a particular culture and must relate to that culture, but the church stands outside of the culture because it is not an institution or an organization; it is the Body of Christ. As the church in Russia had to battle to forces of Communism for its very existence, so too does the Church today have to battle a very insidious foe, secularism.

Secularism is a very subtle and dangerous enemy. It does not seem like an enemy at all, but rather a way for the church to become in touch with the world. Metropolitan Hierotheos (Vlachos) of Nafpaktos, Greece writes: Secularism is the loss of



the true life of the Church, the alienation of Church members from the genuine Church spirit. He goes on to say that secularism began when the persecution of Christians ceased and Christianity became the state religion in the 4th Century. It became very easy to become a Christian, there was no longer a threat to life, Christianity became vogue. Because it was vogue and expected, it became to take on a more worldly character. Christianity became more lax, and the people and clergy, became secular. The way people related within the church and in society was based not so much on the Gospel of our Lord but on worldly expectations. Metropolitan Hierotheos explains that the purpose of the Church is to cure humanity from his/her spiritual illness, to restore to mankind the ability to know and experience God. This is what the Church is supposed to do for its followers. Through the practice of prayer, fasting, participation in the mysteries almsgiving, (sacraments) of the Church, the nous—the heart of man—becomes whole. The nous (the place where we encounter God within our hearts) becomes cured through purification, illumination and divinization (or deification, becoming godlike). An organized Church is one that cures man. Its existence is demonstrated by success in the therapy of the darkened nous. Secularism in the Church is directly related to the loss of the Church's true objective. A

Church...which does not cure man but is concerned with other matters, is a secularized Church.

How does a Church become secularized? It is, if you will, a mindset, a way of seeing the mission and nature of the Church. Metropolitan Hierotheos gives illustrations of a secularized Church: When the Church deals with ideas rather than life; when the Church involves herself in social and philosophical systems; when the Church is occupied with human thought and abstract ideals, rather than curing the faithful. The Church becomes secularized when it is degraded to a social organization. If people of the Church dismiss the prophetic and sanctifying role of the Church and see the Church as a mere decorative element, then the Church has become secular. Thus, if the Church does not heal and cure the souls of her people it is secular. If we, her followers do not use the cures and healings of the Church to heal and save our souls, we are succumbing to secularism. The fault rests not with the Church but with us; we simply have to utilize the healing mysteries (sacraments) of Confession and Communion.

As Greek Orthodox Christians living in America, we are under a great deal of stress. I do not mean the stress of life and the economy, though this is real. I am referring to the stress of what it means to be an Orthodox Christian. We must try to the best of our ability to live the life in Christ, to battle secularism, and heal our souls. We are not alone, there are many examples of people who have done this, simple Christians who have lived in the world and have not compromised their faith. Use their example.

In the words of St Paul: Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us...(Hebrews 12:1). If you look at the history of the Church you will see that God has raised up holy men and women to illumine and guide us. Just during the past 150 years alone we have thousands of such witnesses. The many martyrs under communism and saints like Nektarios

and Methodia of Kimolos; and holy and illumined teachers such as Joseph the Hesycahst, Paisios, and Porphyrios. They, by no means accepted the way of the world as their standard of life; nor did they accommodate themselves to the world. They followed and lived the way of life of our Holy Orthodox Faith; they cured their nous, became holy and now have become as beacons guiding us to the one who gives us life, our Lord Christ came into the world so that we might have life and have it more abundantly (cf. John 10:10). As Orthodox Christians to live our lives more abundantly means that we are in communion, connected with Christ. It means that we know Him and experience Him. It means that we live our life as our Lord instructs us and as the Church guides us. My little children, let us not love in word or in tongue, but in deed and in truth (1 John 3:18). Put your faith into practice.

Though we live in the world and are called upon by our Lord to serve His people living in the world we are not to be of the world. The Church impacts the world through holiness, not through social statements or political position papers. Again, in the words of the Bishop of Nafpaktos: The Church should enter the world to transform it rather than the world entering the Church to secularize it. It is through the witness of the people of faith of our Church, the holy men and women whom we call saints that the Church is able to continue the mission of Christ, to see His work manifest. These people have lived the opposite of secular lives; they have been healed and have become holy through God's grace. As we emulate these people, as we embrace the way of truth; we become healed and cured. Our hearts are purified, illumined and we experience God, and thus we become holy. We are all called to do this. It is the secular mind that says this is only for the clergy or for monks or that these are the ways of the past. Holiness, our living in communion with Christ; living for Him and in Him, is our path to salvation.




